TREE PLANTING PROGRAM

Beautify McKownville—

And improve your property! Order a tree for your yard or the street right-of-way next to your house for planting in early spring to late fall. Help is available for planting street trees. All trees are bare root, at least 1.25–2 inches in caliper (trunk diameter), and approximately 5–7 feet tall.

We will call Dig Safely New York at 1-800-962-7962. DSNY will have all underground lines marked so we'll know where not to dig.

Your Responsibilities

All tough roots from a former tree must be removed before planting your new tree.

Watering

Newly planted trees require approximately 1 inch of water per week. It is essential that you provide the water when rainfall is insufficient. In dry spells, deep water 2–3 times a week with a hose on slow trickle.

Select the appropriate tree

If your tree is to be planted beneath utility lines, please select a tree that will be suitable for that location. See tree descriptions below.

Bare root trees are less expensive, lighter, and easier to plant than balled-and-burlapped or container grown trees, and they adapt more readily to their new sites.

A reputable nursery will supply the trees; however, we cannot guarantee the success of the plantings, or reimburse you if your tree dies.

Orders for planting Fall 2009 must be received by September 30. The trees will be delivered the week of October 26.

Description of Trees and Order Form

Suitable under power line

Autumn Flowering Cherry, *Prunus x subhirtella*, grows to 25 feet. Semi-double pink-tinged white flowers in autumn and again in spring. Brilliant autumn color, followed by ½-inch red fruit

Japanese Tree Lilac, *Syringa reticulata*, grows to 20 feet high and wide; aromatic white flowers in early July.

Serviceberry, *Amelanchier*, a small native tree growing to 20 feet high with a spread of 15 feet; white flowers in April and good fall color. Berries are attractive to birds.

Hedge Maple, *Acer campestre*, a small member of maple family with dense branching; grows 30 feet high and wide.
 # _____ @ \$65.00 **Total: \$ _____**

Ornamental pear, *Pyrus calleryana*, grows 30–40 feet tall and about ½ as wide, with white flowers in early spring. Spectacular fall color. This tree is upright in form and has a rather formal appearance.

Crabapple (Sugar Tyme), *Malus 'Sutyzam'*, fast growing to 18' tall (maximum) and 15' wide at maturity. White flowers in spring are followed by ½ inch red fruits that persist through winter. Excellent for under power lines.

Do NOT plant under power lines!

Ginkgo, *Ginkgo biloba*, grows to 60 feet high and 30 feet wide with interesting fan shaped leaves and yellow fall color; very tolerant of urban conditions.

Greenspire Linden, *Tilia cordata*, a beautiful pyramidal form and an excellent shade tree with yellow fall color; grows 50 feet high and 35 feet wide.

Red Oak, *Quercus rubra*, a native tree that will grow to be very large and produce many acorns.

Elm, *Zelkova serrata*, 'Green Vase' grows to 50' tall with a 40' spread. Similar in form to the American Elm, it grows rapidly and is an excellent shade and street tree.
