The form asks residents, "Do you want Western Avenue in McKownville to become another commercial strip like Central Avenue?"

DOT has not outlined specific plans

for widening Route 20, but Reeb said, "As far as we can tell, the increased width of the road will increase the commercialization of Western Avenue. That's "we're opposed to.

Reeb said the association's drive for community support in fighting the road project has gained the backing of businesses now located along Western Avenue. He said widening the road would force the closing of smaller businesses because "parking would be eliminat-

ed.''
