Guilderland board okays combining water districts

The Guilderland Town Board voted 4-0 Tuesday night to consolidate the McKownville and Westmere water districts, despite requests made during a public hearing that it postpone action.

The requests were made by a group of McKownville residents who oppose building an \$85 million Crossgates shopping mall and fear consolidation would make it easier for the mall developer to have McKownville Reservoir declared unusable by state. authorities.

At present, the developer is seeking permission from the state Department of Environmental Conservation to discharge pollutants into the reservoir.

Although the reservoir is classified as a water. source for McKownvile, the hamlet has not used the reservoir for drinking water since 1972.

The protesting residents asked the town board to make a study of the consequences of consolidation

before taking a vote. Town Board member Virginia Horan, who said she sympathized with the residents' fear, abstained from the vote.

The request for the vote was made two months ago by the McKownville Fire Department and supported by town Water and Waste Water Superintendent Dennis Tyson.

produced what he called a "dangerous situation." Be said the need for more connections has grown more severe over the years because of the number of the

motels and office buildings in the hamlet. McKownville has bought water from Westurere since 1972 when its reservoir failed to provide quality drinking water.

Tyson said he believes consolidation would produce a larger, hence wealthier, district.
