The Lexington, Mass.-based company wants to tear down the gas station and build a new fast-food facility with 86 seats inside and 32 seats outside.

It has an option to buy the site from Chester and Mabel King of McKownville. The option is contingent on Burger King's receiv-

ing the special-use permit it

needs from the town Zoning Board of Appeals. The zoning board has sched-

uled a public hearing on the case for 7:30 tomorrow night at Town Hall

Although Chester and Mabel King were unavailable for comment yesterday, their son, Ste-

phen, said Burger King wants to buy the site, tear down the gas station and build a new facility.
