Wednesday December 12, 2001, 7:00 pm there will be a public meeting of the McKownville Improvement Association at the Holiday Inn Express on Western Avenue. All residents of McKownville are invited.

Mr. Ken Runion, Supervisor of the Town of Guilderland is our guest speaker. Mr. Runion has been asked to discuss the future of Guilderland and the master plan.

Two items discussed at the previous meeting--the proposed new strip mall on Western near the Best Western Motel and the RFP and its suggestion to shift the center line of Western Avenue to the south--will be discussed again.

The McKownville Improvement Association needs to make more of an effort to improve our neighborhood. But what should it do?

Ask the town to: make the Town pond at Stuyvesant more of a recreation resource; plant more trees along our streets; mark (sign) the pedestrian paths such as those between Providence and Stuyvesant Plaza and between Parkwood and Elmwood; install pedestrian controlled crosswalk lights at Parkwood and at Schoolhouse Road; enforce building regulations such as for the vacant "blue house" property across from the firehouse; improve the crosswalk at Fuller Road; put in warning signs facing Fuller Road that the Burger King parking lot emptying onto Western has a traffic signal controlling access of cars leaving the parking lot; construct a bus shelter on Western Avenue; improve storm drainage at several intersections; and/or rehabilitate and construct sidewalks.

This latter item points to a possible conflict. To put in sidewalks not only means using tax dollars but may cause strips of front lawns of residents to be taken and paved. Even rehabilitation of existing sidewalks may lead to the removal of mature trees.

Preserving wider front lawns and mature trees may be more important for our residential area than sidewalks in some areas.

Residents should call Town Hall--356-1980--whenever something in McKownville needs correction. This is by far the more effective method. These calls may not have been happening. For example, storm drains along Western. Many are subject to flooding. A call to Town Hall by nearby residents should bring forth corrective action. If the calls have been made and nothing has happened then the Association should act. But to be more effective a list of problem drains is needed and that requires some small group to make a survey, then meet with the appropriate persons at Town Hall and follow through to make sure the work was done. Likewise for new trees to be planted, and so forth.

The meeting is scheduled to end at 9:00 pm.

The annual meeting of the McKownville Improvement Association is at 7 pm at the Holiday Inn Express on Tuesday May 21. 2002. All residents are invited. The agenda includes the collection of the **Needs Survey** which is included with this announcement, a vote on **The Proposal for Western Avenue** prepared by the McKownville Improvement Association Planning Group, and, the election of Association officers for the coming year.

The McKownville Improvement Association is asking each household to complete the Needs Survey and bring it to the meeting. Or you may return it to the Association Secretary, Kathy LeRoux, 106 Arcadia Avenue, 12203. Or you may submit it to dreeb@albany.edu. Extra copies of the survey can be obtained by sending a request to the email address. The results of the Needs Survey will guide the work of the McKownville Improvement Association Planning Group, for example McKown Road improvements.

The Proposal for Western Avenue Study completed by the Planning Group of the McKownville Improvement Association since our December meeting, recommends curbs, new sidewalks, wider green strips, and trees along both sides of Western Avenue from Church Road to the Albany city line. The space is to come from reducing the seven foot width of the present bike lanes to three or four feet. Not one inch is to come from our front lawns. It also recommends improved walk lights at the traffic light controlled intersections, adding a pedestrian controlled walk light at Brookwood/Knowles Terrace, several bus shelters along the south side of western Avenue, improved street drainage, a reduced speed limit (30 mph) and other changes, including several pedestrian islands, to make Western Avenue more pedestrian friendly. Copies of The Proposal for Western Avenue Study can be obtained be requesting a copy from dreeb@albany.edu, or from the web site http://www.atmos.albany.edu/mckownville/ or by calling Kathy LeRoux at 438-1947 and telling her your name and address and a copy will be delivered to you by foot power. We will be asking all members to approve and sign The Proposal for Western Avenue. Copies of our Proposal will be delivered to all Town officers.

Thirdly, the nominating committee will present a list of candidates for the election of officers at the May 21 meeting. Additional nominations by those in attendance will be welcomed.

Public Meeting McKownville Improvement Association Thursday December 5, 2002

All residents of McKownville are invited to the meeting of the Association at the Holiday Inn Express on Western Avenue on Thursday December 5, 2002, 7 to 9 pm.

Four Bits of Great News. The State University has decided not to build an office building at 1257 Western (across from the fire house). AND The State of New York and Assemblyman Jack McEneny made \$50,000 available to Guilderland for the construction of sidewalks. AND The State University planted about a dozen trees at the end of Knowles Terrace to better protect residents from the sight and noise of cars using the University ring road. AND Stuyvesant Plaza was required to install trees and trim the parking lot lights to better buffer the Providence Street homes from the Stuyvesant parking lots. Additional items for discussion can be brought up by anyone in attendance.

Members of the Guilderland Town Board have been asked to come to the meeting to answer questions. Suggested questions concern the improvements that residents indicated that they needed and are tabulated in the **Needs Survey** (issued August 17, 2002, additional copies available at the meeting). (1)Sidewalks, how much of the McEneny money will be used for sidewalks in McKownville and how do we get additional sidewalks built along the through streets and the smaller streets? (2)What progress is being made on changing the pond at Stuyvesant into a park? (3)Elmwood Street, what is going to be done to stop through traffic from using Elmwood? (4)Is there any progress to report on the Providence, Mercer, Warren area playground? (5)What is being done to stop the flooding problem on Western near Stuyvesant? (6)What do we need to do to get more streetlights? (7) Traffic blocks Providence and Mercer streets sometimes, how do we get DO NOT BLOCK SIDE STREET signs installed? (8)The highway drains are insufficient along Western, what is being done to solve the problem? (9)Are the new SUNY buildings, CESTM and Sematec, going to cause dangerous air pollution problems in McKownville; (10)When is the Town going to start its tree planting program along the sidewalks? How is it going to work? Questions about other improvements, such as trees to block the noise from the Northway, the CDTA buses, and improvements in the walking paths, could also be asked by the audience.

The Association's budget is about \$280 a year. (We spent more this past year because of the large reports on Western Avenue and the Needs Survey). There are about 800 homes in McKownville and we distribute 6 to 8 meetings announcements per year to each. If we got \$1.00 from each household we would be OK for two years. We have \$306.29 in the Treasury. This includes the \$110 collected at the last meeting. If you can, please send a check or give a cash donation to the Secretary, Kathy LeRoux and this will keep us financially secure for another year or so.

McKownville Improvement Association Meeting January 30,2003 Holiday Inn Express 7-9 pm

All McKownville residents are invited to attend the upcoming Association meeting. At the most recent meeting, December 5, Guilderland Town Board members announced that \$50,000 for Western Avenue sidewalks has been secured through Assemblyman John McEneny. Construction will begin as soon as possible. The Town officers, Ken Runion, David Bosworth, Michael Ricard, and Bruce Sherwin (Patty Slavick was held up because of awful weather) gave more great news. A Town financed tree planting program will go forward in the Spring. Thirdly, a vest pocket park near Mercer Streets will be constructed. "Don't Block the Side Street" signs for Providence, Mercer and Warren are to get action from Supervisor Runion's office. The change over of McKownville reservoir/pond at Stuyvesant to a park is going to be done. And seventh, Chief Murley indicated that he will work with the Association to have the speed limit changed to 30 mph on Western Avenue from the City line to Johnson Road.

Creighton Manning Engineering (CME) issued its Report on the McKownville Corridor Study on December 5. The ideas which the McKownville Improvement Association put forth concerning Western Avenue and that many of you expressed at the public meetings with CME and the Town were generally followed. The 85 page CME Report, which includes the results of the Association's Needs Survey, will be discussed at the January 30 meeting. (The 11 pages of Comments on the Report were emailed to all residents who provided email addresses. My email address is dreeb@albany.edu if you want a copy. The full 85 page Report will be sent when it becomes available electronically.)

With the Town promised improvements and the CME Report submission to the Town, Action Committees are needed to work with the Town on implementation. The tree planting program needs specifics for implementation as does the sidewalk on McKown Road as does the sidewalk on Western Avenue as do the sidewalks on the side streets as do the drainage basins along Western and the walk lights and the street lights on the side streets and so forth.

The work of each Action Committee is to gather more specific information on the problem (street corner flooding, for example). With information collected by the Action Committee on the location of each drain basin and its flooding problems the Action Committee members are then equipped to meet with Town officers and hear their proposals to solve the problems, pointing out where their proposals appear to need changes. With the Association officers working with each Action Committee McKownville will be able to help the Town make improvements that will solve the problems pointed out in the Needs Survey and Western Avenue reports, hopefully avoiding future problems that need yet more tax money to be spent.

Discussion of the CME Report and getting the Action Committees in place are the agenda items for the January 30, 2003 meeting.

McKownville residents are invited to the March 13, 2003 meeting at the Holiday Inn Express. Dennis Moore, Director, Parks and Recreation, Town of Guilderland will speak on "The Parks of Guilderland." The recently purchased Western Turnpike Golf course, the new parks for McKownville, these are huge changes. Come to the meeting and find out more about Guilderland parks and recreation.

At the January 30 meeting Stephen Feeney, chair of the Planning Board, and Town Board members Dave Bosworth, Bruce Sherwin and Patricia Slavick announced that a \$735,000 grant will be awarded for the rebuilding of sidewalks, green strips, curbs, crossing lights, drainage and other improvements along both sides of Western Avenue in McKownville (from the Northway to the City line). The construction will begin in three to four years. This year CDTA will construct several bus shelters in McKownville and \$50,000 from Assemblyman McEneny will be used to build sidewalks along portions of Western Avenue in McKownville. At our December meeting Town Supervisor Runion and the Town Board members announced that the tree planting program and the Mercer Street vest pocket park had been approved with funds put into the budget for this year and plans for the pond and park at Stuyvesant are going forward. Advice was given by Mr. Runion on how to secure more street lighting and new sidewalks on the side streets. All of these improvements were requested in the Association's Needs Survey and Western Avenue Report. It is now McKownville's responsibility to push for the improvements and render advice as each planned improvement comes forward. The work of the Association's Action Committees is to become involved in these plans and improvements. It is also your opportunity.

The Action Committees formed at the January 30 meeting are: 1. Pond and park at Stuyvesant (John Esler, chair); 2. Western Avenue improvements (Don Reeb, chair); 3. McKown Road and other sidewalks and trails(Doug Smith and Marty Gnacik, chairs); 4. Mercer Street vest pocket park (David Knight, chair); 5. Tree planting program (Sue Brown, chair); 6. Speed limit reduction (Jim White, chair); 7. Securing more street lights (no chair chosen yet); 8. Western Avenue CME final report (Don Reeb, chair); 9. Flooding (Martha Harausz, chair); 10. Bus shelters and crosswalks (no chair chosen yet). Reports from the chairs of the Action Committees, and recruitment of more volunteers for the committees, will be the focus for the remainder of the March 13 meeting.

A Needs Survey completed by the residents and submitted to the Town and to the consultant doing the Western Avenue Corridor Study Report, and

acceptance by the Town of the consultant's Western Avenue Corridor Study Report and the related funding for bus shelters along Western Avenue, sidewalks along Western and McKown and improvements along Western such as trees, lighting, curbs, gutters, drainage and roadway changes near the SUNY entrance, Schoolhouse Road, Church Road. There are 48 recommendations in the Report. New/better sidewalks along the side streets are included in the Report but funding for these is yet to be found.

The second question—our goals—are the implementation of the recommendations contained in the Western Avenue Corridor Study Report (this will require four or more years)—and—the following additional improvements—trees for side streets and more improvements in the pond. Two very active committees—under the direction of Sue Brown for the former and John Esler for the latter—are working to make these happen. Funding for sidewalks fr the side streets, improved paths—Board member Marty Gnacik is on the Town's Pathways Committee—is another goal. The Western Avenue flyover. If this is built there will be increased noise from traffic for those on Highland and nearby streets as well as for those living along Providence and nearby streets. Air pollution levels will likely rise and some of the buildings along the western side of Schoolhouse Road may be taken for construction of the thruway flyover-- www.thruway.state.ny.us/studies/index.html can be found the following statement concerning the proposed reconstruction of the 25 miles of the Thruway, from Exit 21A to 25A and the flyover.

Can you tell me more about the flyover ramps to and from the Northway and the Thruway? One project alternative that will be reviewed is to construct E-ZPass only ramps to and from the Thruway in the vicinity of the School House Road Bridge near the Western Avenue ramps to and from the Northway. The Authority will consider whether this connection would improve service and reduce delays.

The document received by Todd Gifford-the Town Highway Superintendent--from the Authority-he is Guilderland's representative on the Albany Corridor Study--does not indicate how many if any of the eight or so homes and offices along the western side of Schoolhouse would be taken for construction, nor does the document include any sketch or drawing of the flyover or information about noise or pollution effects. The next step??

The McKownville Reservoir/Stuyvesant Pond. Making the pond more appealing for walking and sitting along its shores is the proposal and has been met with general approval by both residents and Town officers. The next steps need be discussed.

Other topics include the Blue House, Western Avenue improvements, the sidewalks along McKown Road and other streets, and the tree planting program. Please come-participate-McKownville is your community.

As we discussed at our most recent (November) meeting, the New York State Thruway Authority is developing an Albany Corridor Study. It involves changes in the design of thruway exits and the number of highway lanes from exit 21A to 25A. It may also involve the construction of a "flyover" or overpass, flying over Western Avenue near the McKownville Methodist Church. The overpass would connect the Thruway to the Northway directly, but only for EZPass users. If constructed the flyover would add to the noise (especially from truck traffic) for McKownville residents in three areas of McKownville: those living on and near Country Road, those on and near Providence Street, and those in and near Woodscape. Together these may impact a majority of the 900+ homes in McKownville. The Thruway's <u>Draft Summary of the Access Improvement Concepts</u>(about 60 pages) is now available. Only **one** of their six alternatives seems to not involve the construction of a Western Avenue flyover. Frank Commisso, Albany County legislator for a portion of McKownville, serves on the Advisory Panel for the Thruway's Albany Corridor Study. The Panel is meeting on Tuesday, January 20 and Frank will be the featured speaker at our meeting on Thursday, January 22 to help us understand the Thruway's plans.

It is very important that every McKownville resident inform the Thruway Authority that the flyover must not be built (remember the "Crossgates rumble strips"?). Also, you should ask to be notified of the exact time and place of the next Thruway Authority public meeting on the Albany Corridor Study (tentative date February 24). You can use the web address for the Authority, www.thruway.state.ny.us/studies/index.html, its post office address which is New York State Thruway Authority, 200 Southern Boulevard—P.O.Box 189, Albany, New York 12201, or its telephone number which is, 436-2700 (Thruway Public Information Office) to register your opposition. We need everyone's help to stop the construction of the flyover.

Additionally, the work of the Association's committees (Sidewalks, Speed Limits, Park and Pond, Western Avenue, Trees and Treasurer) will be discussed. Come. Bring a friend. Make your opinion about your neighborhood count.

CESTM/State University announced another construction project. The Association has invited the planners from SUNYA and CESTM to speak at the November 18, 2004 meeting.

The Tree Committee of the Association received about a dozen orders for trees this Fall—another very successful effort by the Committee (Sue Brown, chair)—and they will be available for planting in the next few weeks. It probably came as surprise to others than myself to learn that Fall planting of trees is more highly recommended than Spring planting. Additional topics for the meeting are the Shabbos house proposal and the planning for the party with the McKownville Fire Department and the Town to celebrate the transfer of the 1257 property—the Blue House—to the Fire Department. Lastly, the County responded to our letter about Fuller Road and made several suggestions about Elmwood Street as well.

We will have two guest speakers this month. Mike Franchini, Commissioner, Albany County Highway Department, will talk about planned County highway construction in the McKownville area. And Tom Ellis, Citizen's Environmental Coalition and CCNL, will talk about pollution. Mike will be speaking at 7pm.

But first there is something for you to do today---there have been parking and speeding complaints. When parking remember to leave enough space for snow plows and emergency vehicles. This just makes sense. But it is also the law that from November to April vehicles CANNOT be parked on Guilderland roads from 2am to 7am and of course "correct or regulated" side of the street parking must be followed all year long. Second, the curves and hills on some of our streets and the wintery skies and snow banks make it difficult to see pedestrians and oncoming vehicles so it makes sense to drive more slowly during the winter. Park with greater concern about safety and the law and drive with more care. Your neighbors will appreciate your consideration.

At our November meeting, John Giarruusso of SUNYA and Tom Yurkewecz of CESTM gave updates of building plans. Three changes are planned for the SUNYA campus: some new equipment and reconstruction for the heating plant on Fuller Road, a new maintenance building to be located near the pond and a new artificial turf field near the "bubble" building. For CESTM, a new building on the site of the old maintenance building on Fuller Road is planned. The Harriman State Office Building campus redevelopment may be the site for new SUNYA and CESTM buildings also.

The gas station at the corner of Western and McKown Road has requested a change in zoning from BN-RP to Local Business. A sandwich shop is being proposed for the front portion of the building. The Town Board hearing on the request will be February 1. 2005. As for the Shabbos house property on Fuller, no date for the next hearing has been scheduled. The Picotte building, 1450 Western, is being redone and a Western Avenue sidewalk is expected to be constructed, also. The Christ Lutheran Church vacant lot may be developed and then there are the other neighborhood issues—all of which bring us to the Association's **Action Committee** reports—Trees, The Pond, Sidewalks and Pathways, Western Avenue, The Thruway Flyover, Pollution—and these will be discussed along with the Treasurer's report.

Other business during the evening will include reports from the Tree Committee (Sue Brown chair), the Treasurer (Paul Haldeman), and the Farmer's Market Committee (Laura Whalen, David Knight). During the past few weeks there was another burglary in McKownville and more complaints about odors from the City land fill. The Farmers Market–Jim and Cindy Barber's Farm Market at Stuyvesant Plaza–is a marvelous success. Everybody loves it. This has been a great new business for our neighborhood. The market has been open Monday through Friday. After Labor Day it will be open only on **Tuesdays and Fridays**, from 11am to 5pm, until the farm no longer has produce to harvest and sell. Association Board members Laura Whalen and David Knight proposed it, Guilderland Supervisor Ken Runion found us the farmer and put us into contact with Stuyvesant Plaza Vice President Janet Kaplan who found us the space.

The Thruway flyover—the sidewalk on McKown Road—the sidewalks and improvements on Western Avenue—the rebuilding of Fuller Road—the pond—the bus patron waiting shelters on Western—the Schoolhouse Road rebuilding—these and more will be discussed at the meeting.

There are three proposals on the agenda this month.

The Across the Street Pub-1238 Western Avenue--between Arcadia and Hillcrest on Western-is proposing to add a deck. It would be located in the southeast corner of the parking lot that borders Arcadia. Parking at the Pub is inadequate at present and tight up against neighboring parcels. The added noise would be another negative effect.

A Starbucks coffee house is proposed for 1210 Western Avenue. It would have a drive-in service window as well as interior and exterior seating. Plans indicate that there would be very few spaces for the drive-in lane, required setbacks would be below standard and the parking would be up against neighbors' property.

The new Shabbos House–320 Fuller Road–would be 10,000 square feet. It would have nearly zero parking and be about seven times larger than the average residence on Fuller Road.

The October meeting of the Association will be Thursday, October 6, 2005, 7-9pm----Meet the Candidates Night. All the Town offices are up for election this year. Please put this on your calendar. Today businesses need much more space, both for a building and for parking. Gone are the one dentist office practice and the one employee coffee shop and customers walking to the business. Most building lots in McKownville are quite small—7500 square feet or even less. The result is that neighbors find themselves with dozens of cars from neighboring businesses parked illegally—customer's cars parked in their driveways, blocking streets to fire trucks and other emergency vehicles and other obnoxious conditions (noise, smells etc.). Meanwhile attractive residences are located along Western Avenue in McKownville and in the City. The Study Committee hopes to be able to make useful recommendations to reduce the zoning problems along Western Avenue in McKownville.

The Farmer's Market is closed until next year. Everyone deserves thanks for making it a great success. The McKown Road sidewalk might still be constructed this year. No decision yet about the Western Avenue flyover. No reply from Mayor Jennings concerning our letter complaining about the City land fill. The pending zoning cases—Shabbos House, the L'Ecole site at Stuyvesant, the Across the Street Pub request for a deck, the proposed Starbucks near the City line—these are still in process. And no replies yet to the grant applications to improve the pond.

President Hall of the University of Albany hopefully will be our guest speaker at the December meeting. No meeting is planned for November.

Happy New Year. Western Avenue commercial property use will be the major discussion topic at the McKownville Improvement Association meeting in January.

Beginning in 2000 the Town and the Improvement Association worked together to create a plan for public improvements on Western Avenue—sidewalks, curbs, gutters, storm water drainage, lighting, bus patron shelters and so forth. This was long overdue and we will soon see these plans being put into action. Now the Western Avenue highway improvements need be coupled with a restudy of commercial property zoning along Western, especially the south side of Western.

Taco Pronto is for sale/lease as is Denny's as is the vacant lot next to the Christ Lutheran Church as is the house next to Sutters as is 1434 Western (Capital Winnair—the Tusang building). Then 1208/1210 Western is looking to be redeveloped, the Capitol Lodge may be replaced, and Across the Street Pub is looking to expand. As these and other commercial properties along Western are reused, it is important that their redevelopment make the neighborhood a nicer place to live. We are named the McKownville Improvement Association.

To promote this, a Zoning Study Committee was created by Mr. Runion and the Town Board. Its members are Steve Harausz, Mark Macomber, Alice Torda, Laura Whalen and me. We will have had two meetings by the time the Improvement Association meets on the 12th.

More often than not, Western Avenue commercially zoned lots in McKownville are too small to have sufficient parking for the number of customers the businesses now need. Also, the sites commonly have access difficulties because of Western Avenue traffic (the Christ Lutheran empty lot is a great example). The result is that businesses require oversized variances for parking and green space which in turn create problems of parking, traffic, noise and smells for neighbors. The zoning needs to be restudied.

Other news. CESTM&Nanotech expansion plans. The Shabbos. Starbucks. The City land fill. The reuse of the Harriman campus (State office building campus). The Renaissance Hotel at Crossgates. The McKown Road sidewalk. The Flyover. And the Across the Street Pub. The Pub was discussed at the December Zoning Board meeting.

To build the proposed deck on the Pub—it would be in its Arcadia parking lot and next to the older McKownville Fire department building—a 50 percent parking variance would be necessary. This is far in excess of what is usually granted. The Zoning Board chair made the motion to deny the variance. The surprise was that the motion was defeated, with the majority of the Board ignoring the problem of insufficient parking for this use. Neighbors on Arcadia are quite upset. The Association supports the neighbors. The case is still pending and a Zoning Board decision will likely be made in January/February.

The McKownville Improvement Association will attempt to hold all of its future public meetings on the second Thursday of each month, September through June.


The Town appointed McKownville Zoning Study Committee has been hard at work. Its work so far is focused on the future of property uses along Western Avenue—what do we want McKownville to look like along Western Avenue? While this is important, it is the preamble to the larger question of what we want all of McKownville to be in the future.

Besides the work of the McKownville Zoning Committee why are we discussing this now? Five reasons. There are about 19 business properties along Western Avenue that either are for sale, for rent or being considered for rebuilding. But also all of our major roadways—Western, McKown, Fuller and Schoolhouse—are about to be redone in some significant way. Third, major land uses around McKownville are changing——for example, Crossgates has proposed a new hotel, CESTM is adding 250,000 square feet of new buildings, the Harriman campus is changing its use, and new buildings along Washington Avenue——medical buildings and motels——are being constructed. Then of course there are the yet to be announced plans for the Thruway near McKownville—the often discussed flyover. Then there is the Town of Guilderland Comprehensive Plan issued in 2001 which requires that McKownville undertake its Neighborhood Master Plan. While that process may not begin for a year or more, having a "neighborhood dialogue" will help us when the Master Plan process does get underway.

The February meeting will mostly be devoted to discussing what you want McKownvlle to become but of course there will be the usual report——on CESTM, the Shabbos House, Starbucks, the Across the Street Pub, the Harriman campus, the City landfill, the McKown Road sidewalk, the Thruway and other concerns such as the burglaries and other topics you consider to be important.

But the most important business of the evening will be you telling us what you want McKownville to become. To make sure that each person gets an opportunity to state what McKownville should become, the meeting will consist of small group discussions. Someone will write down the ideas presented in each group and a comprehensive report will be constructed and submitted to the Town.

Come———speak out———tell us what you want McKownville to be in the future—and bring a neighbor. And if you have news or questions about what is happening in McKownville, contact one of the Board members. The list below contains their names, addresses, phone numbers and email address.

will soon be the second Thursday of the month and time for yet another McKownville Improvement Association meeting. This is also the month for the Tree Committee flyer to be distributed. We all know that there are places in McKownville that need a tree—a street tree, a front yard tree, a back yard tree. Trees are good for the soul and good for the environment. Plant a tree and make a wish about the future. SO PLEASE READ THE BACK OF THIS FLYER

What has been happening? The Thruway is holding a public meeting on March 14 at St. Sophia at 7pm—the Thruway will be installing sound barriers behind Woodscape and McKown and Strawberry Lane but McKownville needs a good turnout to ask that sound barriers be extended to include the area near Country, Oak and Shady also. Secondly, the Harriman campus had a meeting on February 28 to describe its tentative plans. And the CESTM/NanoTech campus requested the Association appoint several members to a review panel. More about these at the meeting.

McKownville has been waiting since 1924 for some improvements—like sidewalks on both sides of Western Avenue. Implementation of portions of the McKownville Corridor Study, construction of a sidewalk in front of 1450 Western Avenue, construction of a sidewalk along the western side of McKown Road, reconstruction of Fuller Road and of Schoolhouse Road, and construction of a bus shelter at McKown Road are in process and it is vital that as contracts are prepared we add in the little changes we want—for example, decorative street lights along Western Avenue. These little add ins help create McKownville's future and its VISION. At the February meeting we discussed the Vision our neighbors want for McKownville. We are still seeking more ideas—like parking along part Fuller and/or Western. So the agenda for Thursday is both a review of what construction is in store and what your neighbors(and you) have said that might be added.

Finally, the Washington Avenue Corridor, from Brevator Street to Rt. 155 and from Western to Washington, has more than 20,000 jobs and will be gaining more. The area includes medical offices at Great Oaks and along Washington Avenue, Stuyvesant and SUNYA and CESTM/NanoTech and Harriman and Crossgates and Crossgates Commons. As a major employment area for the Capital District it is surrounded by neighborhoods, McKownville, Westmere, two in the City (Upper Washington Avenue and Eagle Hill/Tudor Road), and several more in Colonie and Guilderland. Combined development impacts from Harriman, SUNYA, CESTM and office buildings on these neighborhoods have not been studied because some of the neighborhoods are in the City, some in Colonie and some in Guilderland. The impacts, from traffic, for example, flow into all the neighborhoods. Neighborhood needs, like storm water runoff management and public transit needs can better be solved jointly. Access to the Pinebush and Lake Rensselaer is needed by all of these neighborhoods, for example. The joint study of the Washington Avenue Corridor (requested by County Legislator Frank Commisso) will help McKownville get long overdue improvements.

McKownville Improvement Association Monthly Public Meeting Thursday, April 6, 2006, 7-9pm Holiday Inn Express, 1442 Western Avenue

The Harriman campus—330 acres—also called the New York State Office Building campus—is located between Brevator and the University at Albany campus and between Western Avenue and Washington Avenue and there are plans for its redevelopment. Though the Harriman campus does not border McKownville, its redevelopment could change McKownville as much as did the development of the University forty years ago or Crossgates twenty years ago.

Mr. Tim Dunn from the Harriman Research and Technology Corporation will be the guest speaker. The plans being developed for reuse of the campus include---maybe---office buildings and a hotel along the Washington Avenue boundary with homes between the new office buildings and Western Avenue. Possibly a lake will be added, an amphitheater and park areas. Possibly two new north/south streets. One from approximately the Homestead/Western Avenue intersection to Washington Avenue. Maybe another from the Orlando/Western Avenue intersection to near Washington Avenue. There will be maps and displays at the meeting to better explain the plans.

One concern of McKownville---maybe the overwhelming concern---has to be any additional traffic on Western Avenue in McKownville stemming from the redevelopment of the Harriman campus. The traffic count on Western Avenue continues to increase. The McKownville Corridor Study called for traffic calming on Western and everyone agrees that the noise and other negative impacts from traffic Western need be reduced.

The replanning of the Harriman campus and its traffic is a great opportunity for McKownville to get some relief from the overuse of Western Avenue. As long as Western Avenue has heavy and increasing traffic, it will be difficult to bring McKownville together. People living on the north side of Western Avenue should not be isolated from those living on the south side. We are one place and should be able to travel back and forth across our streets—as well as up and down our streets—safely.

What else? The Board of the Association has met with the people from Harriman; we will be meeting with the people from NanoTech; discussions are ongoing concerning Jim Barber's farm stand; the contracts for construction of the sidewalks (at 1450 Western and on McKown Road) are in process but no firm date yet for installation. The Trees committee has sent in the orders for trees. Thank you very much for your tree orders. And the May 11 public meeting with President Hall is scheduled.

(5) What kind of dangers are you seeing for our children that we may not be aware of? (6) Just how dangerous is it for our children at the local malls? (7) What changes in state or local legislation should we be advocating to make our children and ourselves safer? Please come and bring your own lists of questions.

A number of people in our community are concerned about the horrendous methane odor coming from the Albany Landfill. For those who are we have some information on whom to contact. Tom Reynolds is from DEC Region 4 and his office handles the Albany Landfill. Tom indicated that he gets few complaints because many people think there is nothing that can be done. He needs and will welcome in-put from the community. Please send complaints to him at his E-mail address trreynol@gw.dec.state.ny.us or call him at 518-357-2045. Mr. Reynolds advised us that we ould also inform the landfill staff directly at 869-3651, then select #1. This will get you to the landfill manager, Joe Giebelhaus, you can then leave a message or speak directly to him. In either case please give the following; the date, time, something about the nature and magnitude of the odor, the location where it was observed.

Now for some happy news. McKownville had a marvelous Halloween Party. Jim White, Steve and Eileen Haggerty, Paul Sweeney, Martha Harausz, Alice Torda, Marty Gnacik, Sue Brown, Paul Haldeman, and our County Legislator Mary Lou Bartolotta Connolly did a wonderful job decorating the firehouse, staffing the craft tables and operating the ingenious Halloween games. The March neighborhood meeting is in our usual location, the Holiday Inn Express. (Please note: the Holiday Inn provides us our meeting room without charge—thank them however you can).

Guilderland Town Supervisor **Ken Runion** is our featured speaker. Please come to show our support for his work and to discuss his views for our town and our neighborhood.

In the next few years McKownville will see many improvements. There will be improved sidewalks on both sides of Western Ave., from the City line to the Northway. Fuller Road will have sidewalks on both sides plus other improvements as well. Schoolhouse Road will have improvements similar to those on Fuller Road. McKown Road will have a new sidewalk along its western side. An additional bus patron shelter will be installed on Western, like the one recently installed. Better pedestrian crossing lights are slated for crossings on Western Ave as well as Fuller Road. A grant from the Office of Parks Recreation and Historical Preservation has been received for the development of the McKownville Reservoir as a park; this is in the design phase. Flooding of Western Avenue is being studied by NYDOT and could be eliminated soon. Sound barriers along the Thruway behind Woodscape and other nearby homes will soon be put in place. 

McKownville Improvement Association and The Traffic Safety Committee of the Town of Guilderland Joint Meeting, Friday May 8, 7pm Holiday Inn Express

For some time the Association has been receiving complaints about the parking regulations on Parkwood Glenwood and Norwood streets. The complaints become more common after a number of persons receive tickets for illegal parking—but complaints come in nevertheless.

At the Western Avenue, end of these three streets the parking signs indicate that alternative side of the street parking is in force, with the changeover to take place at midnight. When person do not move their cars at **midnight**, sometimes neighbors call the police and the police have no alternative but to come and write tickets for those cars parked illegally. Recently some 21 cars were ticketed on Norwood Street. Clearly, midnight is not a convenient time for residents to move their car from one side of the street to the other.

At the university ends of Glenwood and Norwood streets, the parking signs indicate that no street parking is to occur during the day while Parkwood Street has signs, which indicate alternative side of the street parking is in force.

While various stories exist about the origin of these parking regulations—the important point is that the present regulations irritate. Therefore, the Association asked the Town Public Safety Committee to convene a meeting of the 150 or so homeowners on the three streets to create a better set of parking regulations.

Please make every attempt to attend the meeting or send your written proxy with a neighbor concerning your preference for parking regulations on your section of the street. Capt Cox and Town Board member Patti Slavick will conduct the meeting. I have every reason to believe that the Town will accept any reasonable set of proposed regulations.

McKownville Improvement Association Public Meeting, Thursday May 28, 2009—7 pm-9 pm Holiday Inn Express, 1445 Western Avenue

We have three guest speakers this month--Ron Byrne, David Clancy and Butch Lawyer. The topic is home maintenance, safety and weatherization. Ron heads the UMBRELLA organization. It provides lower cost repair services for homeowners. David is Chief of the McKownville Fire Department. How to make your home safe from fires will be David's topic. Butch is director of the Cornell Cooperative Extension Weatherization Bureau. He will explain how to achieve cost savings in heating and cooling our home. Saving money and home safety—sensible topics at any time, especially now. And ice cream sundaes will be provided for all—so come early.

On May 8, 2009, the Town of Guilderland Traffic Safety Committee held a meeting at the Holiday Inn Express at the request of the Association. The topic was parking on the three streets--Parkwood, Glenwood and Norwood. They are subject to special parking regulations. Parkwood residents have to switch their cars at midnight from one side to the other. Glenwood and Norwood residents on the lower half of these streets have to switch their cars at midnight while those on the upper half are prohibited from parking on either side of the street during the day from 10 am to 5 pm Monday through Friday. Unhappiness with these regulations has been expressed by many (but certainly not by all) for some years now.

Several suggestions were made including the following. A door-to-door survey conducted by the Association might help us all discover what parking regulations are preferred. Secondly, the time designated for moving the cars, midnight, might be adjusted to a more comfortable time, that time to be discovered through the door-to-door survey. Thirdly, the two parking signs in front of both 17 and 18 Glenwood are in conflict and need be changed.

It is time for the election of Board members and officers. The four officers, myself, Doug Smith, David Knight and Paul Haldeman (president, vice president, secretary and treasurer) have agreed to be nominated for another one-year term. The three officers of the Association whose terms are expiring have agreed to accept a nomination for another three-year term. They are Anita Behn, Martha Harausz and Jim White. The February meeting will focus on storm water.

The Albany County Storm Water Coalition asked to present their work on the Krumkill watershed area to the McKownville neighborhood. Mr. Kelly Nolan conducted much of the research and he will make the presentation.

As McKownville wrestles with its storm water problems and proposed solutions, it is important for the neighbors to understand storm water quality regulations and how they could impact proposed solutions for McKownville water issues. For example, can McKownville just dump more and more of its storm water into the Krumkill without concern about the water quality of the Krumkill or downstream impacts?

Mr. Nolan, having analyzed water quality at 8 locations throughout the watershed, will relate his findings to the Clean Water Act, in particular how these water quality assessments fit the overall architecture of the Clean Water Act, stream classifications, best use criteria, 303d waterbody lists, and other stormwater regulations.

This assessment was paid for by the NYSDEC Hudson River Estuary Program, with the Hudson Basin River Watch program. The Albany County Stormwater Coalition includes 11 municipalities, Albany County and SUNY Albany. The Coalition representative for Guilderland is Rodger Stone while Nancy Heinzen is the director of the Stormwater Coalition of Albany County.

This will be an overview of Kelly's results throughout the watershed, and does not involve anything related to the Delaware Engineering study, or drainage within the Krumkill. Our purpose in sponsoring this program is to promote public education and assist the outreach requirements embedded within the stormwater regulations.

The September meeting will focus on McKownville and its future. We are wrestling with some very important issues at this time and the Board has selected four issues to discuss at this meeting. They are:

- 1. The upcoming hearing on the proposed changes in the town **zoning** law. The hearing is October 6th before that occurs what steps and options would best benefit residents of McKownville. What would the changes mean to our neighborhood?
- 2. The **McKownville Park** on Western Avenue, bordering Stuyvesant Plaza. As a neighborhood what is our vision for the park, what could it be?
- 3. **Storm water** management within McKownville. We will discuss the use of the \$500,000 MultiModal funds that Senator Breslin and the Town Board helped the Town secure.
- 4. Storm water flowing into McKownville due to the Nano Tech expansion and possible solutions to this problem. With discussion of the proposed reconstruction of the Fuller Road/Washington Avenue intersection and how this might impact this issue.

There are a number of other issues that could be touched on if there is interest from the audience and time allows. A few that come to mind are:

New sidewalks—especially along Western Avenue.

Reduced speed limits—on both Western Avenue and Fuller Road.

More acceptable parking regulations—is there neighborhood agreement for revised regulations.

Alleys (carriageways)---how should they function?

Additionally, there will be the **election of officers and board members** and **Ice Cream Sundaes** will be available—free of charge of course—before and after the meeting. The October McKownville Improvement Association meeting will be on October 21.

Just a reminder ...

September 14 is **Primary Election Day**. McKownville Improvement Association, Public Meeting Thursday October 21, 2010—7 pm-9 pm Holiday Inn Express, 1442 Western Avenue

The October meeting will focus on—storm sewers. That is right—storm sewers. Ken Johnson and Fred Grober from Delaware Engineering will lead the discussion on storm sewers in McKownville—answering your questions about where they are, what problems Delaware Engineering found in their survey, their report to the Town --- maybe you can add to the body of knowledge by telling them what you know about the storm sewers in your neighborhood.

All of this will lead to the first phase of improving storm drainage in McKownville. There are not many problems more important in McKownville than storm drainage. Eventually—not just now because there is not yet enough money on hand - but eventually the system will be rebuilt. There is \$500,000, of the \$6 million needed, to begin the work. Since the construction of these sewers was a long time ago, it is doubtful that another rebuilding will occur within the next 75 years. We want to make sure that the most accurate information available is in hand. Make sure you come, listen, and share your information.

Other topics for conversation at the meeting:

ZONING Town Supervisor Ken Runion directed the Town Zoning Revision Committee to include a "hamlet" provision in the proposal for adjustments in the zoning law. Two questions—what does it mean, and what do we want it to mean? The idea is to exempt the McKownville Hamlet—and possibly three other hamlets—from certain provisions of the zoning law or make special provisions applicable only to the McKownville Hamlet. One example of where this might be necessary is for "mixed use developments". These developments could result in some residences becoming businesses on the first floor and rental apartments on the second—something that could further reduce the residential character of McKownville. These zoning implications need much more discussion.

SPEED LIMITS Board members Alice Torda, Ellen Manning and I met with the members of the Traffic Study Committee of the Town to request that the speed limit on Fuller Road be reduced from 40 mph to 30 mph as soon as possible. Captain Curtis Cox and the other members of the Traffic Safety Committee of the Town pointed out that Fuller Road is a county road that includes portions of the Town of Guilderland, the City of Albany, and the Town of Colonie and that if possible it would be advisable to coordinate speed limit changes with these other governments. Therefore, sometime this winter we may see the speed limit reduced, for Guilderland and possibly for all of Fuller Road.

IN ADDITION, Election Day is Tuesday November 2. VOTE—it is important to vote—and remember, the space to be filled in on the ballot is **NEXT TO THE NAME**—not below it... We had a great turnout for the primary and we need a great turnout for November as well.

McKownville Improvement Association, Public Meeting Thursday November 18, 2010—7 pm-9 pm Holiday Inn Express, 1442 Western Avenue

The November meeting will be the last for this calendar year (it will be March before the Association meets again) thus it is important to attend on the 18th and get your "community spirit" fully charged. And ice cream sundaes will be provided, once again.

Zoning will be the topic for our first speaker, **Mr. Peter Barber**. Mr. Barber is the chairman of Guilderland Zoning Board of Appeals, and also sits on the Zoning Revision Commission, which is submitting recommendations for revisions to various parts of the town's zoning laws. While these revisions do not change the zoning status of any home or other property, the revisions might impact McKownville in other ways. How will the new proposals affect issues of long standing concern to the Association? A few areas of concern are: 1. enforcement of the grouper law (multiple students or others occupying a home), 2. the mechanism for zoning enforcement, 3. the paving of front lawns for parking, 4. home occupations (people operating businesses in their homes), 5. the addition of apartments to homes or to business properties. Still another issue is the alleys—how should they be zoned?

A major zoning change is the proposed definition of McKownville as a "Hamlet"---what does this means and can it make McKownville a more sustainable community. While a "hamlet" has no power to tax or in other ways function as another layer of government, it does confer a special status to a neighborhood in the zoning laws. The idea was presented by Town Supervisor Ken Runion at an Association Board meeting and seems to be well worth further development, exploration and definition.

The second speaker is **Ross Farrell** from CDTA, which is our well-known bus service. CDTA is undertaking a major project in the next year to restructure its route services within Albany County. The intent is to create a new route system that better aligns its services with demand. CDTA is currently undergoing a public outreach effort to inform residents and riders of the restructuring and to obtain as much input as possible on improvements they would like to see enacted. Part of this process is to meet with as many neighborhood associations as possible to gain a better understanding of needs and concerns. Concerns in McKownville might include; how to make CDTA more accessible to the elderly, could there be provisions for a park and ride facilities along the Western Avenue corridor, how can CDTA reduce the litter problem at their present stops.

The Halloween Party at the McKownville Fire House was October 31 and was a great success—thanks to all who worked so hard once again and to the children who brought their parents. The southern portion of Fuller Road is nearly finished, along with the new and beautiful sidewalks. Finally, members of the Board of the Association met recently with representatives of New York State Department of Transportation, Region 1; there just might be money available to build more sidewalks along Western Avenue in McKownville. This, of course, is very exciting—but money is always a problem and we are not yet at the stage to know for sure that it will happen—but like tomorrow and tomorrow—it appears to be more likely today that it did six months ago

The April 28 meeting of the McKownville Improvement Association features Guilderland School Superintendent Marie Wiles, Ph.D. and School Board members Judy Slack, Denise Eisele and Emilio Genzano—the topics, of course, are school budgets, school quality and school taxes. Education--there is hardly anything more important to the future of McKownville than the Guilderland schools. Many of our neighbors chose to live in McKownville because of the high quality of Guilderland schools. Hard decisions about the future of the school program, school management and costs are put before the voters every year; this year is certainly a very important year. Before you vote on the school budget this year, come to the meeting and become more informed.

Martha Harausz, a McKownville Improvement Association Officer, has been in contact with Joe Giebelhaus from the Albany City Landfill concerning appropriate reporting procedures should odors from the landfill become a problem. If at any time you smell odors from the landfill please call 518 453-8288 and report the incident. You will need to leave a message recording the date and time of the odor where it was noticed and also some reference to its strength. There is an informative news letter concerning the landfill that can be accessed by email. If you would like to have your name added to the email list please contact Mr. Giebelhaus at giebej@ci.albany.ny.us and ask to be added to the list. In early June a tour of the facility is being schedule for McKownville residents interested in attending.

The New York Thruway Authority is working on the expansion of the Thruway from Exit 23 to Exit 24. A benefit to McKownville is that a portion of our neighborhood will get sound barriers in late 2011. The reconstruction work includes construction of 12 ponds to collect storm water runoff from the roads. If you have further questions or comments regarding the Thruway, please contact the Public Information Office at public.info@thruway.ny.gov. The engineer's office for the project is at the intersection of Russell Road and Schoolhouse Road where you can review the construction plans and drawings.

National Grid and the telephone and cable companies have removed the pole in the alley behind 12 Parkwood, the pole that broke the storm sewer pipe. The McKownville Fire Department and the Town Highway Department have been pumping the storm water out of the alley for weeks and Mr. Runion and the Highway department will repair the pipe as soon as it is possible to do so. Temporary easement forms, signed by adjoining property owners will be needed. In addition, the severe flooding from broken and/or clogged storm water pipes in the Mercer Street area (Tracy, Ann, Providence, Warren) will also be the focus of work by the Highway Department, as soon as it is possible to do so—and again, temporary easement forms will be collected. These forms permit the Town to enter your property, do whatever digging is required—with the promise to restore your property to its pre-digging condition.

The final meeting of our fiscal year will be May 26 when Supervisor Ken Runion will be the guest speaker. We will hold the annual elections for the McKownville Improvement Association Board members and officers at that time. Guilderland Town Supervisor Ken Runion is the guest speaker for the May 26, 2011 McKownville Improvement Association meeting. The annual election of Association officers and Board members is scheduled also, and once again ice cream sundaes are served both before and after the meeting. Self-nominations or nominations of friends and neighbors for the three Association Board seats and four officer positions are welcome. Angie Parsons is the chair of the nominations committee. On June 1 at 11:00, those who are interested in a tour of the Albany County Landfill should meet at 525 Rapp Road at 10:50 a.m., the first building on the left. The tour will take about 1 hour and will be lead by Joe Giebelhaus, Manager of Solid Waste for the City of Albany. Please try to car pool as parking is limited.

The Guilderland Highway Department has been trying to get into the alley behind Elmwood Street and Parkwood streets to fix a broken storm sewer pipe but has not been able to because of the rain. Steve Oliver, the acting highway superintendent, indicated that it would happen just as soon as ground conditions permit.

Mr. Runion spoke to a member of the Association on Monday about the possibility of purchasing a gazebo for the park/pond near Stuyvesant Plaza. A suggested model can be seen at www.genuineamishmade.com, or at their business site, 4022 Western Ave, about a mile west of Rt. 158, on the south side of the road. It is white, octagonal, vinyl and comes in diameters such as 8, 10, 12 and 14 feet.

The University is building a new dorm—Liberty Dorm—and the sanitary sewage from it will be using the Dillenbeck pumping station. It will connect to the Guilderland sewage pipes near Knowles Terrace in McKownville. This will involve digging near the old firehouse and near Dunkin Donuts; other digging will be further east than the homes along Upper Hillcrest, Gaskell and Wood streets. Maps showing the route and places for digging will be available for viewing at the meeting.

The final four items. (1) The Association Secretary, Martha Harausz, is our person working with the New York State Department of Transportation Region I concerning the new sidewalks to be constructed along Western Avenue—both sides—from Rt. 155 to the Albany City line. The funds are in hand, the design is in process, and construction is expected to begin in McKownville in 2012. (2) To control the invasive plants at the park/pond near Stuyvesant Plaza, Association Board member Ellen Manning has secured the cooperation of specialists from Cornell Agriculture. She is also working with other McKownville volunteers who are interested in this venture. (3) The Barber Farm Stand is returning to McKownville—July 1, if the weather cooperates. (4) The date of the next Association meeting, in September, has not yet been determined. McKownville Improvement Association Special Meeting—Concerning the University and McKownville Thursday July 21, 2011—7 pm-9 pm Holiday Inn Express, 1442 Western Avenue

The University is looking to buy and redevelop the Holt-Harris property in McKownville. The property is nearly 9.0 acres and borders Norwood Street, the University ring road and Waverly Place. The asking price is \$1.6 million. Its assessed value is \$597,900, it includes two houses (one of which is occupied), is nearly fully treed and has several sizable hills. These features help to buffer numerous McKownville homes from the University. One of the houses on the property is of historic value and should be preserved.

Members of the Board of the McKownville Association met with **University President George Philip** on Wednesday, June 29, 2011 to discuss the University plans for the Holt-Harris property. President Philip informed the group that the University was interested in purchasing the property, but only at a more reasonable price than what it is now listed for. He did not indicate what the University planned to do with the property. Several other sources, however, indicate that the University could use the 9 acres to construct a University gymnasium and or a baseball field.

During the meeting, Association Board members emphasized that when the University was constructed it promised that it would not convert residential property in McKownville to University use. Since the 1960's McKownville residents have banked their home owning futures on this promise, it is essential that this promise be kept. Less than a decade ago the University pulled away from buying the home at 1257 Western Avenue (the now vacant lot across the street from the fire house) due in large part to the Association's reminder of this promise, and some other concerns about its development.

In addition to the major concern, violation of a long-standing promise, University use of this property will bring issues of parking, noise, traffic, light pollution and other intrusions into our neighborhood. Additionally, the loss of property tax revenue would be meaningful to the McKownville Fire District, which relies on property taxes.

The Association Board members informed President Philip that their preference is that the property continue to be of residential usage. If more intensive development is to occur, additional private housing is the neighborhood's preference. The Holt-Harris site is zoned R-15 which would allow residential structures on 15,000 square foot lots.

As a community we need to be mindful of the fact that the University, as part of the state government, is not subject to zoning and other Guilderland land use regulations. When it comes to development of this land by the University we will have to rely on public appeals, letters, petitions and other actions. This **Special Meeting** of the neighborhood is to explore what we should do. We need ideas and we need neighbors to join together to stop this institutional incursion into the residential area of McKownville.

Our Association believes that keeping McKownville a wonderful residential neighborhood should be our goal. Conversion of the Holt-Harris propter to University use does not further this goal.

The major topic of this month's meeting will be the Holt-Harris property. On October 13, 2011 UAlbany President George Philip reported that the University made an offer to buy the Holt-Harris property. The offer was for a fraction of the listing price and it was rejected by the seller. President Philip then went on to say "...and we do not anticipate making a counteroffer at this time". A McKownville resident, Laura Barry, was at the University meeting and will discuss the announcement. The question for McKownville is, what do we do now? One option is to ask the Town to buy the property (creating a McKownville special tax district to fund the purchase). The recent survey polling interest on this subject will be discussed.

The hurricane floodwaters made obvious to all that urgent help is needed to clean, repair, and rebuild McKownville storm sewers. We have to work with the Town to find a path to relief. The Town did repair the storm sewer near Parkwood and also the cave in from a broken storm sewer at 1449 Western as well as others. Homeowners on alleys, which are in daily use, are actively investigating whether more paving is one solution to the storm waters cascading down the alleyways. We need to intensify our effort to find answers. The solutions that some residents are using to solve their storm water issues may not be sustainable as owners attempt to sell their properties and inspection of the house is undertaken. We are not the only community with storm water problems, none-the-less we need to increase our effort to solve the problem.

The Barber's farm stand in McKownville will be closing for the season Friday, October 28.

The McKownville Tree Committee has several orders for trees again this season—thank you!

Other topics to be discussed—a safer crosswalk on Fuller near Mercer, a lowered speed limit, a report on Western Avenue sidewalks, work on McKownville Reservoir Park and the Thruway widening and installation of sound barriers near Woodscape.

The annual Halloween Party at the McKownville Firehouse is Monday, October 31, from 5:30-7:30 PM. Joey D the Magician will be performing his Halloween Safety Magic Show.

The guest speaker for the November meeting is Rodger Stone, Zoning Enforcement Officer for the Town of Guilderland. Zoning enforcement is a continuing focus for the McKownville community. Residents often have questions concerning zoning regulations and when they or their neighbors might be in violation of regulations. These issues may include the following:

Shrubs overhanging sidewalk areas. Fences that are too tall. Fences constructed in a sideyard when the home is located on a corner lot. A business operated in a home. Storm water running off one property onto another. Boats parked on lawns. Boats parked on the street. Camping trailers parked on the street or parked on the lawn. Large trucks parked on the street. Movable storage sheds parked on a property for weeks and weeks. Sheds located too near a property line. Smells from nearby restaurants. Snow pushed into the street. Unlicensed cars on a property. Business signs that are too large. Grass clippings thrown into the street. Major house repairs done without building permits.

Residents are at a distinct disadvantage in interpreting the zoning ordinance because we do not use it on a regular basis. Rodger does, and he has the power to recommend legal action if there is a violation. Come join us and learn more about Guilderland Zoning Law.

Tree planting was a success---Ellen Manning, Sue Brown and Ricardo Lopes Torrijos again handled the delivery of the trees and their planting. Thanks to each of you. Since the previous meeting, on Wednesday November 30, 2011, the electronic sign requested by Stuyvesant was denied by the Guilderland Zoning Board of Appeals. As a flashing sign it was prohibited by the Guilderland Zoning Ordinance. We are please that the Zoning Board enforced the law as it is written.

It is wonderful that dozens of people wrote letters to express their opinions on the matter of the flashing sign. The significant number of citizens who attended and spoke at the Zoning Board meeting was also impressive. Community support and involvement is truly the key to keeping McKownville the type of community we are happy to live in.

The Holt-Harris property is still in the hands of the Holt-Harris inheritors. We know of no change in the owners' terms of sale. We can only hope that with time they come to see the benefits of working with the community.

The McKownville neighborhood did an unbelievably fine job of demonstrating to the University at Albany that we value our neighborhoods and are willing to work to maintain it in both size and quality. Hopefully, the clear action by McKownville residents will forever dissuade the University from buying and developing property in McKownville.

The University did announce that the football stadium--on the site of the Giants practice field--would go ahead. That site is in Guilderland but Town Zoning laws place no restrictions on State government property uses.

The sidewalk along Western is still in process of being designed. What a great day that will be when McKownville gets usable sidewalks on both sides of Western in McKownville. When will it be built---maybe 2012, maybe 2013--but the money is there along with the commitment by the Town and the State. Therefore, they are coming.

Drainage--storm water flooding---continues to be a problem. In 2010, The Town contracted Delaware Engineering to do a Drainage Study (it is available on the Town web page). We are fortunate to have such a good document to use as a basis for discussion. The proposed complete solution is of course very costly. Nevertheless, it is the belief of the McKownville Improvement Association's Board that we should try to take steps towards addressing this issue. It is clearly understood that an immediate or even projected complete solution to our storm water issues are not possible unless a great windfall of money should appear but as a community we should start thinking about what steps are possible. Drainage is a neighborhood problem and it needs neighborhood involvement and a group effort to work toward a solution. Come to the meeting on March 28, 2012 to join with your neighbors to begin a discussion on the issue of Storm Water.

The McKownville Tree Committee—Ellen Manning Chair—again provides the opportunity to buy trees for planting. The brochure is printed on the reverse side of this announcement. While McKownville has numerous trees they are more often than not located in the rear of the property rather than along the street—and it is streets trees that make a neighborhood much more attractive to neighbors and potential neighbors. If you have a place for a street tree, please consider planting one now. Thank you.

At the March meeting, it was noted that National Grid would replace faulty gas pipes on Knowles Terrace. The residents on Knowles Terrace have had the problem of water getting into the gas pipes that then shuts down the pilot lights on furnaces, hot water tanks and stoves. Letters and phone calls to National Grid and NYS Public Service office got action and the pipes are being replaced.

Other news: Washington Avenue Extension is being rebuilt so that more buildings for NanoTech can be constructed. Though many residents expressed doubt that this was a reasonable use of \$26 million—the cost of moving the highway—it is happening. In addition, sound barriers on the Thruway near Woodscape—something McKownville residents have been requesting from the Thruway Authority for many years--will be installed in 2012 or 2013. Concerning the Holt-Harris property: nothing more has come from the real estate firm handling the property for the owners. Therefore, the proposal to create a woodland park on the 10-acre site is moot for the time being. The University is busy building a dorm, a business school building and other buildings. The field at the north end of Knowles is being excavated for its football stadium. A new sidewalk along Western is still in process of being designed. When will it be built---maybe 2012, maybe 2013--but the money is there along with the commitment by the Town and the State. The stakes with pink/red tags along Western Avenue---there is one near Dr. Esmay's ex-office and another near the end of Norwood Street—mark the State right of way—not the location of the sidewalk.

The Zoning Board's Hearing on Wednesday April 18, 2012, 7:30pm at Town Hall, will again consider the request for a home occupation on Providence Street. The applicant wants to operate a "garage-attic-basement cleaning-disposal service" from his home and park a trailer on his lawn for storage. At the recent Hearing, several neighbors sent emails objecting to the business and a neighbor and I spoke against it. Attend the Hearing or email your comments to cropseyd@townofguilderland.org or call 356-1980 and ask to speak to Don Cropsey to register your comments.

This month's meeting will be focused on storm water problems in McKownville and what can be done to reduce McKownville's flooding problems. In 2008, the Town and the McKownville Improvement Association cooperated in conducting a drainage (and sidewalk) survey of problems in McKownville. Over 200 Survey's were returned (the 31 streets surveyed have 693 homes). Some 53% of respondents reported property flooding problems and residents assumed (correctly, given the US Geological Survey data available) that the rising water table is a problem. Of the more than 200 respondents, some 40% have sump pumps, while over 21% have water proofed their basement walls, about 16% have regraded their property to reduce flooding, and more than 4% have put in auxiliary electric generating equipment to operate sump pumps when the electricity gets interrupted. One home has used sand bags to divert storm water from entering the basement.

However flooding is more than a basement problem—the storm water needs to be moved out of the neighborhood more quickly and that means the storm sewer pipes need to be improved. That is what needs to be addressed—how the neighborhood is going to get this done---and that is the focus of the April meeting.

McKownville Improvement Association, Public Meeting Wednesday May 16, 2012 Holiday Inn Express, 1442 Western Avenue, 7pm

This month's meeting is focused on storm water problems in McKownville and the proposal to create a **Drainage Special District** for a major portion of McKownville. It is felt that the formation of this district is necessary in order to get the storm water pipes and storm water catch basins in McKownville inspected, serviced, cleaned, maintained and repaired on a regular basis. This has not been done in the past, partly because of the lack of a **Drainage Special District** and many of the pipes and basins are located on private land.

The pipes were used to drain both septic tank leach fields and storm water. Since the installation of a sanitary sewer system in the 1970's the pipes and catch basins are used only for storm water drainage. The Town Highway Department services them in emergencies, but to limit Town liability it needs permission to do so when the pipes are on private land. The formation of a **Drainage Special District** would give the Town ready access to the pipes and catch basins.

Delaware Engineering in 2010 issued its Town of Guilderland financed survey of the drainage problems in McKownville. It estimated \$6.5 million to construct adequate drainage pipes and catch basins. Neither the Town nor McKownville property owners can afford this. The Town is looking for grants and has had some success. In the meantime, the best hope to reduce drainage problems in McKownville is to improve the maintenance of the present system of pipes and catch basins.

The Town of Guilderland in 2008 conducted a storm water survey of homes within the Association's boundaries, which are the same as the McKownville Fire District. Of the 867 homes in the district, 232 surveys were returned and half reported flooding problems. Of those responding 40% have sump pumps, more than 4% have put in auxiliary electric generating equipment to operate sump pumps when electricity is interrupted and 48% said a modest tax to reduce drainage problems would be acceptable.

Therefore, to maintain and improve the McKownville drainage system, the Association is proposing the creation of a **Drainage Special District with a tax of \$0.26 per thousand-dollars of assessed property value.** For a \$150,000 home, this would amount to a yearly tax of \$39.00. For a \$200,000 home, this would amount to \$52.00. No more than \$15,000 of the yearly revenue will be used each year for maintenance with the remainder deposited in a fund and used along with grant money for improvements as they occur. The district boundaries will be those of the McKownville Improvement Association and the McKownville Fire District but not including the following streets---Gaskill, Wood, East and West Dillenbeck, the Woodscape streets, Coralberry, Elderberry, and Strawberry. Their benefit from inclusion in the **Drainage Special District** would be too small to justify their paying the tax.

Finally, an election of officers and Board members will occur at the meeting---Alice Torda is serving as the nominations chair---to enter a nomination call Alice at 489-3613 or make the nomination at the meeting.

Supervisor Ken Runion will be the guest speaker at the September meeting. Much of the discussion undoubtedly will focus on the proposed drainage district for McKownville.

Thirty-one volunteers---William Dealleaume, Lynn Nasadoski, Henry Tedeschi, Angie Parsons, Harriet Temps, Bob Benson, Richard Goldstein, Judi Kavaney, Marcia Luther, Bill Goergen, Paul Graves, Dave Bosworth, David Shub, Steve Campbell, Marty Gnacik, Laura Barry, James White, Kevin Quinn, Jessica Mann, Carl Patka, Doug Smith, Debbie Trees, Emily Baglione, Ricardo Nirenberg, Tom Robert, Janet Reilly, Bert Schou, Lisa Stanzione, Anita Behn, Dennis Mason and myself---went door-to-door numerous times to get signatures on the petitions—404 signatures from 444 homes.

Nearly 91 percent of the homeowners contacted support the creation of the McKownville Drainage District.

The signed petitions were handed to the Guilderland Town Board on Tuesday September 4, 2012. The Town Attorney, Mr. Richard Sherwood, was given the assignment by the Town Board to develop legislation and the other information necessary for the Town Board. The Town Board will schedule public hearings. When the Town Board will vote is not yet known.

To finally get unified responsibility for all of the old storm sewer pipes—to remove from individual property owners the responsibility of maintaining the storm sewer pipes on their land—to get better maintenance of the existing pipes—to get older broken pipes replaced---to get better protection from flooding for our homes, garages, gardens and property---to finally get some relief from flooding and the threat of flooding---to move one step closer to having a new and adequate storm sewer system---all of this for about \$40 a year in additional taxes per home—it seems to the Board of the McKownville Improvement Association that this is something we should all work hard to support.

Mr. Runion at the Town Board meeting encouraged those with questions about the drainage district to write, call or come in to talk with him. So come to the meeting. Ask questions. And send a clear message—about your support for the formation of the drainage district. It may be the most important action you can take to preserve your home and your neighborhood. If no one in your household had the opportunity to sign the petition, please call (489-3909) and I will bring a petition to you for your signature.

News--- the Barber farm stand on McKown Rd has great produce to sell for another few weeks--the Town made more improvements to McKownville Park--Hansen flooring is asking for permission to have another business in its building—Stuyvesant Plaza has not asked for another hearing to put a flashing sign at its Western Avenue entrance—the sound barriers along the Thruway in McKownville are nearly finished--the University redesigned its Western Avenue entrance—CDTA changed its bus schedule on Western Avenue—NYSDOT announced that the Crossgates flyover will be rebuilt next year—several streets in McKownville have been resurfaced by the Town Highway Department--and the University is remodeling buildings along Fuller Road.

The Association's Tree Committee has again done stalwart work and provided us with a selection of trees to purchase. The order form is on the reverse side. Along with the concern about getting more trees planted in the front of homes, it is of concern that homeowners have trees removed before it is necessary to remove them for safety reasons and do not replace them quickly. It takes less than a day to cut down a mature tree but a generation to grow an adequate replacement.

The October meeting is Thursday October 18th—the topic will probably again be the drainage district—it is worth a least two meetings.

Ice cream sundaes will be served at the September meeting—so come early and have dessert with your neighbors. The Association spent more than expected this past year—for the printing of the petitions and for the postcards that were mailed to each home concerning the proposed district. Therefore, donations are needed. If you can afford to send some money, please do. Another 10 donations of \$10 to \$25 each would put us in decent shape for another year.

Our first public meeting of 2013 should get us in the mood and ready for spring.

Sandra S. Walck, Garden Designer----will be our first featured speaker at this March 21st meeting. Sandra is a professional garden designer and has been working in the Capital District for 25 years. She specializes in using native plants and emphasizes using ecologically sound practices and completely organic materials. The most immediate place to enjoy Sandra's gardening design is around Creo Restaurant in Stuyvesant Plaza. She, also, works with the Pine Bush association. Sandra will give a short presentation and then she will gladly answer questions about the gardening challenges and opportunities that our area presents.

Storm sewers----after the petitions containing 406 signatures were delivered to the Guilderland Town Board the Town Board directed Delaware Engineering to prepare the necessary papers for filing the request with NY State to form a Special Storm Water Sewer District for McKownville. Town Supervisor Ken Runion will speak at our March 21 meeting and answer questions about the proposed storm sewer district.

Up-coming meetings --- Thursday April 18 and Thursday May 23 are the Association meeting dates for the remainder of this fiscal year. There are a number of community improvements we should discuss — a better pedestrian crosswalk light at Mercer/Fuller, lowered speed limits on Fuller Road and Western Avenue, a pedestrian crosswalk light at Knowles-Brookwood, an island, for safer pedestrian crossings, near the University entrance, and other improvements. Suggestions are welcome.

Ice cream sundaes will be served this week, so come early, bring a friend, enjoy yourself, and do your part to make sure that McKownville continues to improve as a community.

Now a bit of catching up on McKownville news:

It is with great sadness that we inform those who may not know that **Sue Cobb Brown**, a long time Association Board member from Westlyn Place, passed away in November. A moment of silence and a few brief comments about her extraordinary contribution to the community will be part of our meeting. In addition, the community will plant a tree in her honor in McKownville Park---the Tree Committee of the Association (Ellen Manning, Sue Gutbezahl, Laura Whalen, Janet Reilly, and Ricardo López-Torrijos) will conduct the tree planting ceremony. An email announcement will be sent when the dedication date draws near. The Tree Committee, which Sue helped to found, and its **announcement concerning trees for sale this spring**, is on the reverse side of this flier. Remember—a tree planted in front of your home is a benefit to you and your neighborhood.

Western Avenue Sidewalks--- the Western Avenue sidewalk design is in progress at NYSDOT. Construction could begin in 2014.

Stuyvesant's Flashing Sign---the electronic sign proposed by Stuyvesant Plaza for its Western Avenue entrance was denied by the Town. The Association argued that it would violate the Town's zoning ordinance on several grounds. We are pleased that the zoning regulations were upheld.

Stuyvesant Plaza----about one-half acre of land was provided to Stuyvesant Plaza by the Town through an easement in 2009 for construction of 26 parking spaces. This land borders (south of) TGIFriday's. The land had long been part of the McKownville Reservoir property. The Town Planning Board has discussed the parking plan and it was sent on to the Town Zoning Board; further discussion will occur at their April 3 meeting. Since the easement has been granted the discussion is now focused on issues such as lighting and other portions of the "Special Use Permit," a permit required before construction can begin on land uses involving businesses.

University and Nano-Tech---surely all residents are aware that Fuller Road roundabouts have been constructed and the University is busy building a new football stadium and other buildings. We are pleased to note that our best information tells us the ten acres of the Holt-Harris property is not under consideration by University for ownership and development.

Treasury--- we appreciate the nearly two dozen residents who responded to the request for donations to the Association. The Treasury now has \$330, enough for another year of operation. Thank you.

Our Guilderland schools are one of our most cherished public services: Guilderland Schools Superintendent Marie Wiles, Ph.D., will be a guest speaker at the April meeting also. Like all public services, schools ask for public support and that means neighbors need to be kept informed about its programs. The programs offered by the Guilderland schools and the accomplishments of the students (our children and grandchildren) will be one focus of her talk-—the other portion being available to answer questions.

At the April meeting ice cream sundaes will be served----come early—have dessert with your neighbors. The May meeting will be Thursday the 23rd and Geoff Wood, NYSDOT will be the speaker, discussing the new sidewalk to be constructed along Western Avenue in McKownville. Also at the May meeting there will be the election of Association officers.

McKownville Drainage District. At the April 3rd Guilderland Town Board meeting the proposal for a McKownville Drainage District was discussed and sent on to the Town Clerk to be recorded. This was a very important step. The next step is for the Town Board to hold a public hearing on the Drainage District. It is scheduled for Tuesday May 15th. There were about 25 neighbors at the April 3rd Town Board meeting. Hopefully even more will attend the May 15th Town Board meeting. Please put it on your schedule.

Stuyvesant Plaza. The Plaza is proposing to construct a 26-space parking lot between TGIF and McKownville Park. The Plaza gave over \$123,000 to the Town to re-construct the pond-reservoir and the Town provided, in November 2009, an easement to use 0.51 acres of town land for a parking lot. Some have questioned not just the plans for the parking lot but why Stuyvesant spent the original \$123,000 and now seems willing to spend some where in the area of \$800,000 to construct a small parking lot. The plans for the parking lot, as presented by Stuyvesant, cuts down many trees, takes a big chunk of Park land, increases the dangers from left turns in the Plaza, which in turn causes the threat of backing up even more traffic on Western. These are just some of the problems associated with this planned parking lot development. The Zoning Board hearing on the Plaza's proposal will be on April 17, Town Hall 7:30pm. Do come. Stuyvesant Plaza is attractive but it is misusing our public parkland.

McKownville Improvement Association, Public Meeting Thursday May 23, 2013—7 pm-9 pm Holiday Inn Express, 1442 Western Avenue

The guest speakers for the May 23 meeting are Geoffrey Wood and Steve Taylor, from the New York State Department of Transportation, Region 1. They are the Director of Design and the Project Manager for the sidewalk project on Western Avenue in McKownville and Guilderland, from the University entrance to Rt. 155...

This, \$1,000,000++, project will construct sidewalks on both sides of Western Avenue. The construction of the sidewalk on the north side of Western Avenue will begin in 2014 and be completed from the University entrance to Rt. 155 in that same year. The south side of Western Avenue will have its sidewalk constructed the following year (2015). This is a great opportunity to ask questions about the construction of the sidewalk in McKownville and let NYSDOT know what is wanted—better drains—curbs—bike lanes—sidewalks properly slopped for drainage--for example. The design is not finished so there is time to put forth concerns and requests.

Storm water. At the May 7th Town Board Meeting one agenda item was the McKownville Drainage District, the district petitioned for in the summer of 2012. To great surprise, Town Supervisor Ken Runion proposed that rather than forming a Drainage District the Town would allocate \$100,000 each year to the Guilderland Highway Department for repair and replacement of storm sewers. This would eliminate the formation of the district and the previously proposed special district taxes of \$0.26 per \$1,000. The expectation is that much of the \$100,000 will be used in McKownville, although it is for all of Guilderland. Supervisor Runion indicated the Town would continue to search for major grant monies to fund portions of the McKownville storm sewer project. Mr. Runion's proposal was adopted unanimously by the Town Board. Strangely, just prior to the Town Board Meeting many McKownville residents received a robo-call asking them to oppose the drainage district. It was sponsored by the Republican Party. At the Town Board meeting, no one opposed either the drainage district or Supervisor Runion's alternative.

The "Sue Brown Oak Tree" was planted on April 27, 2103 at the McKownville Reservoir Park. Ricardo Lopez-Torrijos, Ellen Manning, Jim White and Sue Gutbezahl made the arrangements and conducted the ceremony. Do visit the tree and pour a bottle of water on the roots. Nurturing is what Sue Brown did so very well and we need to nurture her tree.

In a related matter, the Association would like to stop Stuyvesant Plaza from building a parking lot on .52 acres of the very parkland where the recent tree dedication was held. Hiring a lawyer, picketing, writing letters to Town Hall and the newspapers, boycotting Stuyvesant Plaza, are among ideas being circulated within the neighborhood. The Town Zoning Board will be reviewing the proposal this Wednesday at a public meeting. The ZBA meeting is at Town Hall on Wednesday May 15, 7:30. At present, there are wooden stakes in the Park showing the position of the wall that will support the parking lot. This wall will be over 10 feet high, at points, and consume much of the grassy area on the north side of the Park. Please come to the ZBA meeting or email Jackie Suidy—zoning administrator—"Jackie Siudy" <siudyj@townofguilderland.org>, indicating your opposition.

The first guest speakers for the September meeting are Geoffrey Wood and Steve Taylor, from the New York State Department of Transportation, Region 1. They are the Director of Design and the Project Manager for the sidewalk project on Western Avenue.

Geoff Wood and Steve Taylor will be explaining to McKownville residents the design for the new sidewalks on Western Avenue in McKownville. The tentative timetable and other information will be available, as will Geoff and Steve to answer questions. McKownville residents, especially those living on Western Avenue, and the Town financed McKownville Corridor Study have strongly supported new sidewalks. The present sidewalks, where they exist are often covered with mud, storm water, and are broken beyond repair.

Steve Oliver, Guilderland Highway Superintendent, will be our second guest speaker. The Guilderland Highway Department not only builds and maintains our town roads but also is in charge of maintaining storm sewers—and recently the McKownville storm sewers have been added to his department's responsibilities.

Steve Oliver will report on the storm sewer work that has been completed and be available for questions about plans for more storm sewer work in McKownville. The storm sewers in McKownville are in need of repair and replacement. The Town financed a storm water sewer system concept study, and that report, by Delaware Engineering, is available. The town recently—May 7th-- allocated \$100,000 to the Guilderland Highway Department to be use on storm water issues. This should become a reoccurring yearly allocation, which will allow the department to have funds to address emergencies and do some limited proactive projects. The major goal still remains, to acquire grants and fundings to finance the major needs.

NEWS The Town of Guilderland passed a resolution to lower the speed limit on Fuller Road in McKownville to 30mph. It will now match the speed limit on the remainder of Fuller Road. McKownville residents, especially those living on Warren, Mercer, Providence and Elmwood, requested this. The lower speed limits will improve safety not only for drivers but also for pedestrians and bike riders.

The Town Highway Department is constructing a sidewalk along the west side of Elmwood Street, from Western to Fuller Road. This is a new venture by the Town and the Highway Department. The portion that is completed is very attractive and the residents have praised the work.

The recent primary election did NOT experience a large turnout—hopefully, this is will not be the case when the November election occurs. Remember—without large voter turnouts in McKownville there is no way our neighborhood can continue to convince elected officials that our requests for improvements should be given serious consideration.

The McKownville-Barber farm market on McKown Road continues to have the finest vegetables—Monday, Wednesday and Friday, noon until 5:30pm. Ice cream sundaes will be served at the Association meeting—come early—have dessert before the meeting with a friend or neighbor.

The November meeting of the McKownville Improvement Association will feature two reports from guest speakers.

Geoff Wood and Steve Taylor of the New York State Department of Transportation, Region 1 will give an update concerning the Western Avenue sidewalk construction. This is a major improvement for McKownville---when complete we will have new sidewalks on ALL of our through streets—McKown Road, Fuller Road, Schoolhouse Road, and Western Avenue----improvements that 15 years ago were unimaginable.

Richard Goldstein, a McKownville resident living at 24 Warren Street, had solar panels installed on his house roof several years ago. Residents have expressed curiosity about the costs and "profit" that can be attained by installation of panels. Richard will relate his family's real experience with the use of solar panels.

In 2017 CDTA plans to introduce "BUSPLUS" to the Western Avenue corridor. BUSPLUS is like an express bus--it has limited stops, better bus patron shelters and other improvements. Currently there is a BUSPLUS route along
Route 5 between Albany and Schenectady. The very preliminary plans for a Western Avenue route will be
discussed.

The McKownville Improvement Association Board Members would greatly appreciation community feedback as to what items and areas of improvement are most important to the community. The items on the reverse side of this form will be discussed at the meeting. If you are unable to attend this meeting please take a few moments and rank the items listed, "A" being the most important. Feel free to write-in an idea not listed. Please return your survey to Don Reeb, either by email, donreeb@gmail.com or by US mail, 5 Norwood St.

The parking lot near TGIF at Stuyvesant is nearly complete. The easement agreement signed by Stuyvesant provides that persons other than users of the Plaza may park in the new parking lot. It is clear that parking spaces are available for park users and since the easement is both exclusive and nonexclusive easements (p.2, 11/16/2009) there are additional option open to the public. However before the public takes advantage of this, a clear understanding with the Guilderland Police Department and Stuyvesant Plaza is necessary and that has not been finalized. We will keep you informed on this issue.

One of the defining characteristics of McKownville is the voting record of its citizens, this year was no exception. Town wide about 9,000 votes were cast. McKownville's two election districts accounted for 735 of these votes, 225 more votes than in 2011. McKownville Election District 3 (the McKownville area north of Western) and Election District 4 (the McKownville area south of Western) each increased the number of persons voting this year. McKownville's voting was between 40 and 50 percent of registered voters while that for Guilderland was closer to 30 percent----the Board of Elections is still tabulating the absentee ballots so final numbers are not yet available.

The April meeting of the McKownville Improvement Association will feature <u>University at Albany Associate Vice</u> <u>President for Finance and Business John Giarrusso.</u>

We have invited Mr Giarrusso to our meeting because it is important for us to remain informed about University activities for many reasons. They are our neighbor with a significant portion of the campus is in McKownville.. Students at the University are volunteers with the McKownville Fire Department and student organizations regularly benefit our community by doing litter collections along Western Avenue. Many McKownville residents use the campus for recreation, and, as a reminder, their library is available to all.

Current items that are of interest to us are: a parking garage, an ETEK building (incubator for new businesses), a football stadium addition and other construction. Additionally, reconstruction of dorms are in the discussion stage for the campus. While not all of these changes will be in Guilderland, they will impact our neighborhood in various ways and so we welcome hearing form the Vice President.

Other topics of interest that are open for discussion, are:

- The informational meeting that was held concerning a private dorm that might be built on Western Ave near Tudor Road.
- NanoTech's construction of a building and a plan to build a second
- The Harriman campus may be constructing a large science building, Wadsworth Labs, this season
- Apartments are planned on Schoolhouse Rd, opposite Oak and Shady Streets, they are not just approved
- Crossgates is planning an additions, despite ongoing traffic concerns on the Northway ramp
- The former grade school building owned by St. Margaret Mary's is available for lease
- A developer is proposing 220 new apartments to be constructed near Patricia Lane and Westmere School.

Earlier this year Gordon Associates met with Board members to describe its plans for a **strip mall** on the Christ Lutheran property, approximately across the street from the entrance to Stuyvesant Plaza. The Board was not able to encourage this project because we believe that it would cause horrible traffic problems. Traffic consideration on Western Ave, as well as East Highland, would make this use of this property unacceptable. The nearby entrances and exits for Stuyvesant Plaza and the dentist's offices on Western already have the area saturated with ingress and egress needs. In addition, the Board questioned what impact this project would have on flooding in the immediate area.

A sidewalk update; Geoff Wood and Steve Taylor, of the New York State Department of Transportation, Region 1, informed us that they are not quite ready to "go to contract" on the **Western Avenue sidewalk**. Tentatively, the final plans will be ready to discuss with the neighborhood at the Association Meeting in May.

Gordon Companies, of 50 State St, Schenectady, 462-7411, will be presenting their proposal for this property. They will be discussing their vision of placing 15 to 20 apartments above two retail stores at this location.

With the election of school and library board members at hand, Tuesday, May 20th from 7a.m. to 9p.m., the McKownville Improvement Association is pleased to have the opportunity to give neighbors an opportunity to hear from two people in leadership positions with these organizations. We hope this will give residents a chance to become knowledgeable about the operations of each group, the property tax rates for each, and the changes proposed in their programs. And, of course, to ask questions.

To begin our informational evening, on May 1, we will hear from Dr. Marie Wiles, Guilderland School's Superintendent. On April 8 the Guilderland Board of Education unanimously adopted a \$92,132,900 budget for the 2014-15 school year. If approved by voters, on May 20, it would result in a 1.94 percent tax levy increase for the coming year.

The second speaker is Tim Wiles, director of the Guilderland Library. On March 13 the Library Board unanimously adopted a budget of \$3,541,967 for the 2014- 2015 fiscal year. If approved by voters on May 20, it would result in a 1.847 percent tax levy increase for the coming year.

In recognition of EARTH DAY, we are please to announce our very first CLEAN-UP-DAY for the McKownville Reservoir Park. It will be held on Saturday, May 3rd from 10 am to noon. Gallup, of the Town's Parks Department, recently assisted several Board members on a walk-through to help form a plan for this clean-up. In addition to cutting back invasive species, there is of course trash to be gathered. We will meet at the TGI Friday's end of the park. Rain date Sunday May 4 at noon.

On April 22, 2014 there was a special meeting of the Association at the Holiday Inn Express. The purpose of the meeting was to hear a proposal for a mixed use complex to be built on the 2 acre lot adjoining the Christ Lutheran Church property on Western Ave. The Gordon Co., represent by Mr. Tim Gordon, would like to build a complex with 2 retail establishments on the first floor, topped by 2 additional floors containing 15-20 apartments. Most of those attending were from the streets to the south of this land. In general those present spoke of grave concerns. Some of the concerns highlighted were: the safety and feasibility of a "right only" entrance and exit on Western Ave., increased traffic on residential streets as patrons of this site search for a cut-through to allow travel to the west, the impact on already existing storm water problems, and the zoning changes required for this project.

Of course, ice cream sundaes will be served.

Construction will begin at the University end of the project and proceed to Rt 155, on the north side only. The south side sidewalk will get underway next year.

On Saturday, September 20, 2014, the Association plans to have a McKownville Neighborhood Party to celebrate our new Western Ave sidewalk and to enjoy the refurbished park. This will be pot-luck-bring-adish picnic. We are planning an early evening event in McKownville Park, located between Western Ave and the Plaza. Volunteers are needed to help organize the party. At a recent Association meeting, Town Supervisor Ken Runion indicated that the Town is willing to pay for "street light pole banners" for McKownville. Eighteen banners are to be placed on Western Avenue and Fuller Road street light poles, to help declare and define the neighborhood. Hopefully, artistic residents will be willing to submit a design of the banner for consideration. (One design has been submitted). The design is to feature the word "McKownville" and needs to indicate that McKownville is part of Guilderland. Lastly, a graphic should be incorporated. Music, a children's dog parade and contest, and a potluck supper have been planned. As you know, McKownville in recent years has acquired several new sidewalks—Western Avenue being the most recent. Fuller Road, McKown Road, Schoolhouse Road and a portion of Elmwood Street are the others provided through our Town government. So come and celebrate what we ALL have accomplished. See the invitation on the reverse of this flyer for more information. And please plan to attend. Support your neighborhood organization—it needs you and you need it.

Banners. The McKownville Improvement Association suggested street banners be placed on utility poles in McKownville and the Town of Guilderland agreed to pay for them. A design competition was held, a design was selected by a committee and the banners are being printed. The banners will be located on Western Avenue and on Fuller Road. The thousands of persons who travel through our neighborhood will know the identity of the neighborhood---McKownville—and proud of it.

NanoTech. It seems certain that Nano is intent on buying all of the Loughlin Street homes. Loughlin Street is located in the City of Albany and off of Fuller Road near the cemetery. The implied intent is for NanoTech to replace the ten houses with another Nano building. Understandably, property owners on nearby Warren, Mercer and Providence streets in Guilderland and McKownville are asking questions about whether their homes will be next. Everyone should know, first that the Fuller Road Corporation—the development arm of Nano—cannot force anyone to sell. It does not have the power of eminent domain. Second, a change in zoning is necessary for construction of an office building in a residential area and the Town of Guilderland will never grant such a zoning change for Warren, Mercer, or Providence street homes. These streets—the area is known as The Garden Park Estates—had a street party a few weeks ago at which this topic was mentioned—while different opinions about Nano's threat to the area exists, it is up to all of McKownville to do the work necessary to control its own future.

Alleys. About 106 properties in McKownville border alleys (and jointly own the alleys). These 106 properties include many of the older homes on Elmwood, Parkwood, Glenwood, Norwood, Waverly and Western. Some sections of these alleys are still used for their original purpose, to access garages. It is a responsibility of the 106 properties to maintain the usefulness the alleys. The Association is now more active in contacting the property owners and working with them to maintain the alleys—something that should have been done years and years ago.

Ross Farrell of CDTA (Capital District Transportation Authority) is our guest speaker on Wednesday March 18, 2015. To better serve the University campus, NanoTech, Crossgates Commons, and Crossgates CDTA is developing a Bus Plus route. This will have some impact on Bus Route #10, the Western Avenue bus, come and get early information and give feedback.

Storm sewers—the Town Board announced that a \$500,000 multi-modal grant received through Senator Breslin and administered by NYSDOT would be used in McKownville to construct a storm water pipe under RT 20, a new collection system and catch basins and a new outfall to the Krumkill. It may not be completed in 2015. Probably by the end of 2016.

Picnic in the Park---scheduled for September 26, 2015. Please hold that date for Sidewalk Celebration #2. Last year's picnic was a great success so please plan to meet your neighbors as we once again celebrate.

Sidewalks---the construction of sidewalks on the south side of Western Avenue has begun.

Other news: (1) the drainage pond that Nanotech uses, which empties into the Fuller Road storm sewer, has been emitting a foul odor for some months. NanoTech will remedy this during the upcoming construction season (2) the Getty gas station, 1229 Western across from DunkinDonuts, was closed some months ago and is under more de-construction. No information is available as to what comes next for that site (3) the Black and Blue restaurant, 1470 Western (former 99 Restaurant site), is under construction. Its opening date is unknown (4) the Association petitioned the Town to rezone three homes (1420 Western, 28 Schoolhouse, 8 McKown) from LB (local business) to R-15 (residential, 15,000 sqft lot size minimum), to better protect the residential character of our neighborhood (5) McKownville banners, National Grid, Verizon and Time Warner approved the use of their poles on Western and Fuller roads for placement of our banners (6) Town approved destruction of a home at 1422 Western to allow construction of a parking lot to serve the reconstructed building at 1424 (former Esmay dentists site) (7) a proposed new zoning ordinance is under discussion and a draft is available on the Town's web page.

Albany County Executive Dan McCoy and Guilderland Library Director Tim Wiles will be this month's guest speakers. The County of Albany is possibly the "hidden government service provider" for most people. It provides the County Courts (including the family court), the election board, maintenance of county roads (Schoolhouse Road and Fuller Road in McKownville). It provides other safety and social services for those in need including; Medicaid, the county nursing home, the county jail and the sheriff's department. Director Wiles will discuss the programs offered at The Guilderland Library: its book collection, children's programs, music programs and computers available for the use of patrons. This is your opportunity to learn more and ask Executive McCoy and Director Wiles your questions.

Street Banners — progress is being made, the contracts for use of the National Grid poles have been signed, the banners are being printed and soon the Town of Guilderland will be installing them.

Zoning— The plan to buy both Dr. Esmay's former dental building and the white house next door, 1424 and 1422 Western Ave, has been abandoned. During title searches it was learned that 1422 Western had a deed restriction that required it to be used only as a home. This will help the Town and the Association preserve the residential appearance of Western Avenue in McKownville.

SUNYAlbany news—a new school for the College will be located on the Harriman campus near the State Police buildings. Some of the pressure to expand into McKownville is thereby reduced. At this time the University is renting several floors in Stuyvesant Plaza Executive Towers as "relocation" space. It needs these spaces to temporarily house staff as re-hab to some of its 50 year old buildings occurs.

Nano College and Its New Dorm—The Field Real Estate organization purchased 12 homes on Loughlin and Fuller Rd., all are located in Albany. Soon thereafter, Nano College put out a request for a private contractor to bid to build a dorm for 500 students, May 25th is the expected contract award date. It is important to assure that the city and county not loose the tax income from this area. Additionally, Loughlin Street is zoned residential therefore; a zoning change may well be needed for construction to occur. This project could have two substantial impacts on McKownville: increased storm water problems and "block busting"--the inability of zoning laws to protect residents. Assemblywoman Patricia Fahy has been working with Albany's Mayor and the Governor to express our concerns. This is an appropriate time to write the Governor and let your voice be heard.

Park Clean-up—May 2nd--come join us—9am-noon--sprucing up McKownville Reservoir Park. Bring your favorite tools for lopping or chopping or help pick up trash. The rain date is May 3rd, also from 9:00 a.m. to noon.

New York State Assemblywoman Patricia Fahy is our guest speaker this month. She has been meeting and talking with New York State, Guilderland, Albany County and City of Albany officials about SUNY Poly's expansion plans. At this time it is not known if SUNY Poly plans to expand into McKownville but we welcome the opportunity discuss this matter with our representative.

McKownville residents are very concerned about SUNY Polytechnic Institute's (SUNY Poly) recently announced dormitory construction plans. SUNY POLY requested bids to construct a dormitory for 500 students, to be built in three phases, 2016, 2017, 2018. The exact location has not been decided but the requirement is that it be near the College. The winner of the SUNY Poly dorm contract will be announced May 25. Rumors are that Loughlin Street will be the location. A very large development firm, Columbia Development Companies, bought twelve homes and vacant lots on and near Loughlin. It also purchased a home on Mercer St. The SUNY Poly College is a giant on our border, with \$20 billion in investments. Unfairly, their expansion plans are seldom disclosed until construction is nearly underway.

Additional, proposals for the construction of privately owned dorms have been rumored and or announced. The most recent one is for the corner of Railroad Avenue and Fuller Road, in the Town of Colonie. It is not clear what connection any of these privately owned dorms would have with SUNY Albany or SUNY Poly.

A letter to Governor Cuomo from the Association said---"SUNY Poly should promise that it will not expand into McKownville". SUNY Albany's promise made in the 1960's to not expand into McKownville has continued to be honored. We hope that SUNY Poly makes that same promise.

NEWS. The underground tanks have been removed from the former Getty gas station, 1229 Western Ave. At this time no announcement concerning the future use of this property has been made.

The three apartment buildings on Schoolhouse Road, across from Strawberry Lane, are nearing completion.

Guilderland approved Local Law #2. The Town and Building Department Supervisor Donald Albright have been working to get this more rigorous building enforcement program underway. This program is designed to deal with poorly maintained, foreclosed, vacant and abandoned properties. Such properties are sometimes called "ZOMBIE" properties. Several dozen ZOMBIE properties dot the town (Governor's Motor Inn 2505 Western, and a home at 634 Top Ridge are two examples).

Nominations for Association officers are Don Reeb (president), Doug Smith (vice president), Martha Harausz (secretary) and Paul Haldeman (treasurer), each for one year terms. Janet Reilly, Jim White and Ellen Manning are nominated as Board members for three years terms. Additional nominations can be made at the meeting.

The elections for library and school budget and board members take place on May 19. **Please vote.** Free ice cream sundaes are served at our neighborhood meetings.

The Thursday March 10, 2016 meeting will begin with a discussion of the proposed burger restaurant. The Getty Station (1229 Western Avenue, Zoning LB, lot size 200x130) was removed and a **BurgerFi Restaurant** is proposed. The builder/engineer will present sketches and other information.

The University at Albany Foundation purchased the 9.8 acre Holt-Harris parcel near Waverly and Norwood streets. A neighborhood emergency meeting was held January 21, 2016 to discuss opposition and to develop a resolution... "asking the University to adhere to the town zoning ordinance and the property deeds in its use of the 9.8 acres"... (limiting use to two homes). The Town passed a similar resolution. Neighbors are circulating a petition supporting both resolutions. The petition will be available for signing at the meeting.

Across the Street Pub (1238-1240 Western) is proposing a deck on the east side of its building. In addition, reconstruction of the dental office (1424 Western for Dr. Francisco Banchs) is in process.

A horrible house fire on Ayre Drive could have resulted in multiple deaths had not our McKownville fire department (the Guilderland police department, Five Quad ambulance service from the University, and others) been so prompt (and brave). Financial donations to aid the displaced Morrissey and Sawyer families continue to be needed. (Key Bank, Western Avenue is accepting donations).

A proposal for a **new zoning law** for the Town will be made—the hearing will be March 15, Town Hall, 7:30pm.

Concerning **SUNY Poly** and the 11 (now vacant) homes on Loughlin and Fuller, the neighborhood has been quite strong in registering its opposition to expansion of SUNY Poly into McKownville.

The November Halloween party at the McKownville Fire house was wonderful, as usual. **Thanks to the many donors** the Association is again secure, financially. The dates for public meetings of the McKownville Improvement Association are March 10, April 14, May 10, and June 16. Ice cream sundaes will be served, as usual, at the meetings.

SUNY Poly's construction of a 750 space-parking garage and a 130-bed dorm will be built on its campus—not on Loughlin. Columbia Development owns the 11 homes on Loughlin. Hopefully Loughlin will return to a street of <u>occupied</u> single-family homes once again. The fear that SUNY Poly will expand into McKownville has less justification now.

The Holt-Harris property

The University at Albany Foundation has removed dead trees and filled holes where wells once existed. Windows and doors on the buildings are covered with plywood. SHPO—New York State Housing Preservation Office was contacted by the McKownville Improvement Association and asked to determine the age of the older home and the barn. The LaGrange family (Albany settlers in the 1690's) owned the 9.8 acres and a much large tract that stretched from Patroon Creek (near what is now Washington Avenue) to the Helderberg escarpment and might have built the two buildings. A McKownville Improvement Association circulated petition, signed by over 200 McKownville neighbors, was mailed to 11 local government and State government officials including Governor Cuomo. It asked that the University pledge adherence to the zoning and deed restrictions that apply to the property. Our Assembly Member, Patricia Fahy, is closely monitoring use of the property, as is our Town Supervisor, Peter Barber.

Loughlin Street The McKownville Improvement Association opposes the application for rezoning to multi-housing and the construction of 173 apartments on the 5.6 acres. That intersection is unsafe, the nearby historic cemeteries will be further damaged, and it will add to noise/storm water/air pollution and the danger to pedestrians and bikers.

School and Library Vote On May 17, voters approved the school budget (1493 to 584) and elected three School Board members (Barbara Fraterrigo, Gloria Towle-Hilt and Teresa Gitto). The library budget (1429 to 639) was approved also and two Library Board members (Bryan Best and Jason Wright) were chosen.

The Planning Board on May 25th approved the commercial building site plan to replace the "palm reader house" at 1206-1210 Western. Guilderland Highway Department removed on June 6 the fire-damaged home at 7 Ayre Drive. The tragedy of the fire for the Morrissey family, the generous donations to the family by McKownville neighbors and the bravery of the McKownville Fire Department members will not be forgotten. Loughlin Street—(Sandidge Way is its new name)—is the major current problem. The Albany County Planning Board disagreed with the rezoning of Loughlin Street that is requested by the investors. The rezoning (if approved by the City's Common Council) will permit the construction of 173 apartment units on the 5-acre site. The County Planning Board noted that its density is extreme in comparison to the single-family homes on Loughlin and on nearby streets in McKownville. The County also noted that more coverage of the 5 acres adds to the groundwater and storm water problems in the McKownville area while the apartment occupants will cause increased traffic congestion on Fuller. The expected build out of SUNYPoly and SUNYAlbany will add to both problems.

Originally, the Loughlin Street site was purchased by Columbia for \$3.5 million with the intention to sell the property to SUNY Poly. That did not happen when an investigation of possible collusion between Columbia and SUNY Poly was launched. Massry recently bought the site for \$4.5 million; Dawn Homes is to be the owner of the apartments. The investors need to over-build the 5-acre site to recoup the excessive price paid for Loughlin Street homes.

The **City** is revising its zoning law and the **County** again will review the Loughlin Street zoning proposal. The investor's request for 173 apartments on Loughlin Street has not changed.

Moreover, since the investors intend to apply for a tax abatement, the **City** taxpayers may suffer a loss with development---increased tax receipts possibly will not offset the increased demand for services (fire, police, ambulance, school, library, parks, storm sewers etc) from the 173 apartments. In addition, McKownville will suffer from increased traffic and storm water problems.

Our guest speaker, Chris Spencer, is the Director of Planning for the City. It should be interesting to hear his viewpoint on the new zoning for Sandidge/Loughlin and the proposed construction of 173 apartments. (Spencer Jones, Dawn Homes Management, will be at the meeting).

Please email Mayor Kathy Sheehan (<u>mayor@albanyny.gov</u>) indicating opposition to the proposed 173 apartments on Loughlin—and ask friends who live in the City to do likewise.

Other News. (1) Gates were erected at the Holt-Harris property entrances. (2) A metal plaque honoring Sue Brown will be installed in McKownville Park (with the help of our Parks Department). (3) The Town Safety Committee is petitioning the State to lower the speed limit on Western, as residents have suggested. And (4) ice cream sundaes will be served before, during and after the meeting.

University----As absurd as anything else, there are again reports of persons (students?) using the woods at the end of Glenwood and Norwood streets as a bathroom. The University has provided porta-potties near the basketball courts but is now looking to build toilets at the site. Should you observe anyone urinating, or worse, please contact the SUNY Police at 442-3130.

There will be two guest speakers talking about changes that might influence McKownville's future-----John Giarrusso from the University at Albany and Peter Barber, Guilderland Town Supervisor.

McKownville residents have many concerns about McKownville's future that the Association has been working to address.

What is going to happen on Loughlin Street/Sandidge Way? Many neighbors wrote letters, sent emails, attended Albany City Council meetings, and testified at those Common Council meetings. The City is in the process of a citywide rezoning process; however, it is generally supporting the pleas of Massry to rezone this area as a separate issue. The current request is the same as the one proposed by Columbia Developing and Dawn Homes. Confusion surrounding the indictments and confusion surrounding the "not yet complete" new zoning ordinance makes the future of Sandidge Way very unclear. Opposition to the 173 apartments by McKownville residents is however quite clear.

What about our storm sewer problems? \$3.25 million in grants—from Senator Breslin (\$500,000), Senator George Amedore (\$1.5 million) and Assemblymember Patricia Fahy (\$1.25 million) are helping Guilderland begin the repair, reconstruction and addition of storm sewers in McKownville. Additional grants are needed but some of the work will begin when the State finishes processing applicable paperwork--which is being pushed as hard as possible.

Holt-Harris--what is going to happen to that vacant land? It is about to be transferred from UAlbany Foundation ownership to UAlbany ownership. After that nothing has been announced, though it is rumored that the University Chapel House located on the original Holt-Harris plot is about to be demolished.

Other News. The community by a vote of 90 to 46 approved the firehouse referendum on enlarging (putting a second floor, and other changes) the McKownville Fire House. Expected cost is \$3 million

The Halloween party at the McKownville Fire House was a wonderful event. Next year please come and watch how much joy the children get from playing the games and getting a tattoo and having a special balloon-hat made. It shows McKownville as its very best.

#1. Noise from the Thruway/Northway traffic - protests have been filed with the State. #2. Western Avenue speed limit reduction - is being worked on. #3. Wolanin's illegal placement of oversized trailers on the Pinnacle Place property - is being worked on. #4. The former Getty station on Western and the former "palm reader" house across the street from it-- neither developer has been active recently. #5. Foreclosed and zombie houses in McKownville--progress has occurred - a home on Parkwood, another in Woodscape are occupied or in process.
